Mr. Shaw claimed that it was no part of his duty to run around to the different departments seeking information. The vouchers should have been tabled as asked for. He showed that even from the meagre statement submitted something was radically wrong in connection with those ferries. In the statement submitted by the Commissioner of Public Works for 1898, M. A. McLeod appears to have been paid \$360, at the rate of \$50 per month, as engineer on the Effia whilst the name of the same M. A. McLeod appears as having received \$421, or \$60 per month, as engineer on the Hillsborough. He showed that the same man appears to have been paid for acting as engineer at the same time on both steamers.

He thought that \$14,000 was not sufficient to place the roads in good repair. If the roads we have can be kept in repair it was about as much as could be done without opening any new ones. There are usually opened up for political purposes rather than for the accommodation of the people. He asked why the wharf at Brudenell was not proceeded with when the material had been purchased.

Taking up the matter of our claims upon the Federal Government Mr. Shaw showed what had been done in this respect by the Conservatives and Liberals. The Liberals in 1892 submitted a memorial regarding these claims, in which they made an error of \$20,000,000 as was subsequently admitted by the then Leader. The Leader led the people to believe that these claims would be submitted to arbitration, and that by reason of this arbitration a sum sufficient to keep the people free from taxes would be the result. But this arbitration was not forthcoming. Nothing has been heard of it since. It has served the purpose for which it was intended. The people took the bait and returned the present Government.

While the Liberal delegations were barren of results the Conservative delegations were fruitful. They received \$150,000 on account of our claims and obtained the steamer Stanley, costing another \$150,000. They also added \$400,000 to our capital at 5 per cent., or \$20,000 a year. The Liberals' last delegation cost the country \$750, and there was not one iota of benefit derived from it. The Conservatives had every reason to be proud of their record as compared with what was done by the Liberals.

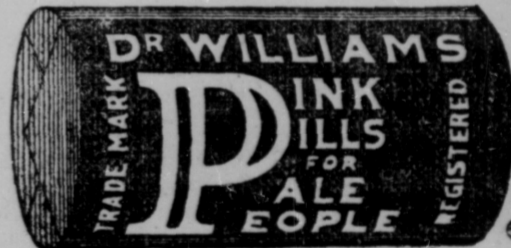
