FOUND DEAD.

The Sad Ending of a Well-known Truckman.

The lifeless body of Allen McInnis, a well-known truckman, was found in the barn-yard of Mr. Philip Curley, saloon keeper, Grafton Street, about ten o'clock on Saturday night. The body was discovered by Mr. Curley, and was in a half reclining position with the throat across the arm of a rustic bench near the barn.

Mr. Curley saw McInnis sitting on the bench about half an hour previously. Subsequently when he went across the yard to see what was the matter he found him dead in the position above described. With all possible despatch medical aid was on the scene, but too late to be of service.

Dr. Conroy, coroner, was also notified and a jury was empaneled. After viewing the body the inquest was adjourned until this evening at seven o'clock when evidence will be taken in the city court-room. The jury is made up as follows: Samuel Beaton, foreman, John Connolly, Charles Campbell, James Neil, Wendell Harvie, S. M. Poole and Lawrence Whelan. It seems that McInnis came down town early in the evening, and between seven and eight o'clock went into Curley's yard where some men were tossing cents. He appeared to be about as usual, although it is said that early in the day he complained of not feeling well. It is further stated that he had not eaten very much during the day. While they were in the yard it is said that the men ate some lobsters, and a "square-face" of gin that one of the party had in his pocket was passed around.

McInnis belonged to Rustico Road, and was for a time keeper of West Kent School. He was about 50 years of age, and leaves a widow and large family.

Her figurehead is an admirable bust of Lord Nelson, with underneath an artistic scroll displaying the Trafalgar signal—"England expects that every man this day will do his duty."
