

UNCLAIMED POST OFFICE ORDERS.

I have noticed a correspondence on the subject of unclaimed post office orders which seems to me to possess some general interest. It is stated that the aggregate total of unclaimed orders during each year exceeds £7,000. It certainly seems strange that the money unclaimed within the specified terms of twelve months should be appropriated by the Post Office, without any measures being taken to discover the owners and remit to them their money, minus some slight deduction for expense, at which no one would demur.

COMMENDABLE.

Lord Jersey, it is stated, is setting apart a portion of his estate at Middleton Stoney, near Bicester, for cultivation by the labourers of the parish. The land is let on most advantageous terms in plots of not more than one acre, and many of the inhabitants are availing themselves of thus becoming peasant occupiers.

A SCENE IN THE "EMERALD ISLE."

An unusual scene occurred on Thursday in the Carrickmacross Workhouse, county Monaghan. The Board was dealing with 500 outdoor relief cases, when a deputation of about 300 persons assembled and sent in memorials and protests against outdoor relief, stating that they were unable to bear their present burdens, much less to undertake fresh ones. The relieving officer, after the Board adjourned, was attacked by the ratepayers, who accused him of indiscriminately giving outdoor relief. So violent was their conduct that the relieving officer had to take refuge in a locked-up room. The master was also attacked, and had to fly from rough treatment. The police subsequently arrived.

STOPPING AN ACCIDENT.

By the thoughtful action of two boys, an accident, which might have been attended with disastrous consequences, was averted on Wednesday on the Malmesbury branch of the Great Western Railway. As the passenger train from Malmesbury was passing through Somerford Station to meet the up and down trains on the main line at Dauntsey, before reaching the latter station the driver saw two lads standing across the rails and holding their hands up. He stopped the engine and found that the bridge crossing the river had given way. The passengers finished the journey in vehicles provided by the company.

THE REAL LEADERS OF THE OPPOSITION.

Let any one attend a Liberal gathering, I care not whether it be in county or borough. If the speaker alludes to Lord Granville or Lord Hartington, there is a murmur of approbation, but he has only to mention the name of Mr. Gladstone for loud and hearty applause almost to drown his voice. This is the protest of the rank and file against the electoral mistakes of the chief of their party. If the general election result in a Conservative victory, this will be entirely due to the half hearted tactics that have been pursued. With the mass of the Liberal electors only two men have achieved that popularity which makes a name a household word—Mr. Gladstone and Mr. Bright—and this is precisely the kind of popularity which calls forth the elective fervour by means of which battles are won.

PORK.—Through the kindness of ex-Alderman Dodson, of Halifax, we were yesterday shown several specimens of superior dressed hogs, delivered at Mr. Bridges' Pork Packing Establishment, which included 15 received from Charles Gregor, Esq., of Brackley Point, averaging 356 lbs. weight each, besides one weighing 616 lbs.—and "a perfect beauty" at that—from Mr. Vessey, of Little York. Yesterday, Messrs. Blake Bros. also purchased from Mr. William B. G. a lot of New Glasgow, twenty hogs, weighing on an average 350 pounds, and from the Messrs. Bullman, Inverness, twenty-one hogs, weighing on an average, 350 pounds. On Friday, Messrs. Owen Connolly & Co., purchased from Mr. Alex. McMillan, Brackley Point Road, eight hogs, averaging 420 pounds, and yesterday the same firm purchased a hog from Mr. John Sturdy, of Crapaud, weighing 658 pounds; and one from Mr. James Simpson, weighing 698 pounds; and four from Mr. Patrick Hughes, averaging 445 pounds each. Pork is now selling at from 6 to 6½ cents per pound.

THE POPE'S VIEWS.—It is alleged that the Pope, having learned that several Catholic dignitaries in England had used violent language against the British Government and supported the Irish movement, has expressed disapproval of their conduct and despatched letters of remonstrance to England.

OTTAWA, March 23. On motion of Sir Samuel Tilley, when the House adjourns on Wednesday, it stands adjourned till Thursday following.

The Minister of Justice moved the appointment of a committee to form a joint committee with the Senate and consider the propriety of amalgamating the law and translating departments of both Houses.—Carried.

Sir Charles Tupper introduced a bill to confirm the purchase of the Riviere du Loup Railway.

General Dumville was assaulted on Maria street, last night, by a man who demanded money. Instead of complying, he held the would-be robber, who was this morning fined 50 dollars, or, in default, three weeks imprisonment.

LONDON, March 23.

The Duchess of Marlborough has written to the Lord Mayor of London that there is now no fear of famine in Ireland, but that great destitution exists in the mountainous parts, and on the sea coast there is great need of clothing and seed.

At a Conservative meeting in Hackney to-day, Sir Stafford Northcote severely condemned Mr. Gladstone for using offensive language toward Austria. He read a despatch from Sir G. M. Elliott, British Ambassador at Vienna, dated yesterday, stating that Baron Von Hauryerle, Minister of Foreign Affairs, desires to disavow language attributed to the Emperor by Gladstone.

PARIS, March 23.

The special London correspondent of Figaro says Hartmann is about to join the Nihilist Committee at Geneva.

Rumors are afloat of fresh attempts against the life of the Czar, and Melikoff is making preparation to defeat them.

It is reported that the famous Abd-el-Kader is alive and in good health.
