THE WELCOME.

A FEW days ago we ventured to predict
 that a very hearty welcome to Prince Ed-
 ward Island would be extended to Sir
 Charles Tupper and Mr. Foster;—and the
 event exceeded anticipation. We do not
 pretend that all who thronged the Steam
 Navigation Company's wharf last evening
 were there for the sole purpose of greeting
 the Liberal-Conservative leaders in the
 House of Commons. In any case there
 would have been many assembled to wel-
 come home our victorious athletes—fresh
 from their latest triumph. But we do
 say that the throng upon Water and Great
 George Streets, when Sir Charles Tupper
 and Mr. Foster delivered their short and
 rousing speeches was one of the largest—
 we might perhaps truly say the largest—
 ever seen in Charlottetown; and there was
 a heartiness in the cheers of welcome
 which proved, beyond a doubt, the
 good feeling that prevailed. Sir
 Charles Tupper was in such good form—
 notwithstanding the exertion of his pre-
 vious addresses at Picton and on board
 the steamer—that his voice rang out fully
 strong and clearly audible by all. It has
 been well remarked that a man who com-
 bines the experience of age with the vigor
 of youth is one whose advice ought to be
 followed. Certainly he gave the Govern-
 ment's obedient servants cause to regret that
 Mr. Finance Minister Fielding had been so
 indiscreet as to prate about "Tupper and
 Toryism," for he challenged comparisons,
 and showed that all the recent great
 liberal and progressive measures passed
 in his native Province of Nova Scotia and
 by the Parliament of United Canada had
 been supported and actively promoted by
 him. In point of fact, Sir Charles Tupper
 is the real Liberal Leader in Canada; for
 before every other living man he has
 fought for those great measures which
 brought to the people of Canada the great
 blessings of political union, of transcon-
 tinental communication, and of the na-
 tional prosperity resulting from the indus-
 trial activity promoted by the National
 Policy; and he is, even now engaged in
 an arduous struggle for mutual Preferen-
 tial Trade between Canada and the Mother
 Country and all parts of the British Em-
 pire.]

Sir Charles Tupper's reference to the
 prowess of our young athletes was timely
 and sympathetic. We must all needs
 be older. But Sir Charles exhibits an
 interest in the rising hope of the country
 which is in strict accord with the princi-
 ples by which he has been guided through-
 out a long lifetime of successful effort.

Mr. Foster's address in reply to the
 cheers of welcome with which he had
 been greeted was all too brief; and his ad-
 dress of this evening, at the rink, will,
 we feel sure, be worthy of the great Parlia-
 mentary orator whose reputation extends
 all over Canada.

The cheers with which Mr. Stewart was
 received as he came forward to thank his
 fellow citizens for the grand welcome ac-
 corded the Opposition leaders in the House
 of Commons, prove that the Opposition
 candidate for West Queen's is the popular
 candidate; and his stirring, eloquent
 words made a fitting end of a remarkable
 event.

"Tupper has already taken the town,"
 was one of the remarks made on the street
 to-day. Everyone was talking about the
 great Liberal-Conservative Leader and
 his powerful address of last evening.

EAST QUEEN'S.

At a very large convention of delegates
 representing all parts of East Queen's, held
 to-day, Alexander Martin, Esq., was unani-
 mously and enthusiastically nominated as
 the Opposition candidate for the represen-
 tation of the riding in the House of Com-
 mons. Mr. Martin accepted the nomi-
 nation in a short and eloquent address. The
 convention was then addressed by Edward
 Hackett, Esq., William Campbell, Esq.,
 Senator Prowse and other gentlemen.

Shortly after three o'clock, Sir Charles
 Tupper and Mr. Foster entered the room.
 They were enthusiastically received
 and repeatedly applauded as they com-
 mended Mr. Martin's past conduct in the
 House of Commons, dealt with the mal-
 administration of public affairs by the
 administration of public affairs by Sir
 Wilfrid Laurier, and gave their solid
 reasons for believing that the Liberal-
 Conservatives will win in the coming
 elections.
