QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY.

Celebration in Charlottetown.—Excursion to New Glasgow.

The Queen's Birthday was quietly observed in Charlottetown yesterday, the public demonstration being reserved for to-night. Throughout yesterday and today multitudes of flags fluttered in the breeze, public offices, stores and private houses being decorated.

The procession to-night will leave City Hall about eight o'clock and will parade the following streets: Down Queen to Water, along Water to Prince, up Prince to Kent, along Kent to Pownall down Pownall to Grafton, along Grafton to Chancery Lane, through Chancery Lane to Richmond, along Richmond to Queen where a circle will be formed and a bonfire and display of fireworks take place.

The procession will consist of the city companies of militia, the firemen, four companies of the Boy's Brigade, and the League of the Cross. There will be several bands of music in the procession, and the fire apparatus will be decorated especially for the occasion.

The Salvage Corps wagon is being especially fitted up and will form a pleasing and attractive feature of the procession. In it Queen Victoria will be represented by Miss Nora Waddell who will be attended by Master Eric Warburton, son of Dr. Warburton, representing Her Majesty's Army; Master T. Fullerton, son of Rev. T. F. Fullerton, as Highlander; Master Hammond Johnson, son of Dr. Johnson, the Navy; Master Moore, son of Mr. Geo. Moore, Soldier in Khaki.

Steamers of electric lights have been placed across Queen Street, near City Hall, and many of the store windows are being especially decorated. The houses on the streets along the route to be traversed by the procession will be illuminated.

Yesterday great crowds of people left the city by train and steamboat. A great many went fishing along the line of railway, and today some tall fish stories are in circulation. There were also several very enjoyable private picnics.

The cricket match at Victoria Park in the afternoon attracted a good many citizens to that popular resort. The sides were captained by Lieut. Colonel Longworth and Mr. Harrison Carvell. Mr. Carvell's side won. Mr. Carvell made the only double-figure, 27. The game was very interesting throughout.

The usual salute from Fort Edward was yesterday fired by a detachment from No. 2 Co., under command of Lieut. Arthur G. Peake.

The excursion to New Glasgow under the auspices of the Abegweit Football Club was attended by about two hundred people. The League of the Cross band was present and their spirited and excellent playing added greatly to the pleasure of the sail in the steamer Stanley.

The party arrived in New Glasgow at 11 a. m., and at 2 p. m. the Abbies lined up against their New Glasgow opponents. The game was not by any means satisfactory. That the Abegweits have the better team there is no doubt, but the soft condition of the ground and the absence of Dan McKinnon were serious handicaps, and the red and blacks failed to score. The game was a succession of scrimmages, and open play was an unknown quantity.

The light Abegweit forwards were unable to cope with their heavier opponents on ground that was soggy and in places wet. The backs were unable to use their wonderful speed and the game was declared a draw. A strong wind blew down the field, and New Glasgow running class took advantage of it. Capt. McLeod kicked off for the Abbies. Scrimmages followed, and slowly but surely the wretches of the black and blue were pushed back, until the ball rested on their ten yard line. In vain the Abbies tried to secure the coveted try. There was a scuffle among the forwards and the ball was carried back to centre.

The ball was a New Glasgow territory during the greater part of the time but we referred without any score. The second half had more open play and the Abbies' backs tried several sprunts, Ritchie, McLeod, J. Macmillan and Beuhner, making steady gains by short runs. Drabbles by Foley and Lou Macmillan brought it rather near to New Glasgow's line and twice it went over. New Glasgow feared to kick out and saved themselves by rousing. The game ended with the ball on New Glasgow's five yard line. Score, Abbies 6; New Glasgow 0; Abbies 2 rouges—draw in Abegweit's favor. Foley, the Queen's University wingman, played a star forward game for the Abbies, while the Abbies' backs and C. M. Quillan did some clever tackling and running.
