

Tignish Resident Assessed \$50

SUMMERSIDE — A resident of Tignish, Louis Francis Gavin, was fined \$50 and costs when he appeared before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald Wednesday morning on a charge of dangerous driving.

The accused, who entered a plea of guilty to the charge, also had his license taken from him for an indefinite period.

Constable John Greer of the Alberton RCMP detachment told the court that he had followed the accused last evening a distance of approximately seven miles between Profit's Corner to Elmsdale, at speeds of 100 to 105 miles per hour. He added that he was not sure of the maximum speed of the accused's car during the chase as the maximum speed he could obtain from the police vehicle was 105 miles per hour and during this time he had been unable to close the gap between the two vehicles.

Constable Greer also stated that the accused had not slackened his speed through built up areas and while proceeding

through the village of Alma there had been small children playing alongside the highway.

Everett George Biggar of Portage pleaded guilty to a charge of driving without a license and was fined \$10 and costs. Joseph Patrick Gallagher pleaded guilty to a similar charge and his case was adjourned to June 22.

For failing to yield at an intersection, Harry Bruce Crozier, Baltic was fined \$10 and costs. On a similar charge, James Ernest Stafford, North Bedeque on a similar charge entered a plea of not guilty. And his case was adjourned to June 22.

Everett Ford, Winsloe North, was fined \$10 and costs for turning his vehicle left from a direct course on a main highway when it was unsafe to do so.

Minister Announces Rates

SUMMERSIDE — Hon. Hubert B. McNeill, minister of labor, announced yesterday that the provincial cabinet has passed prevailing wage rates for all contracts participated in by the government of Prince Edward Island.

The minute-of-council was passed by the provincial cabinet on June 7th and will be effective immediately.

Dr. McNeill stated that all tenders signed by the provincial government will in the future have a clause outlining the minimum rates.

The minister added that his department has been working on this wage rate structure for the past two months, and is quite pleased that it has been passed by the government. The rates will have to be revised from time to time, but he felt that this order is a very important step in modern labor relations.

The minute outlined the minimum rates as follows: laborers, \$1.25; painters, \$1.60; glaziers, \$1.50; paint sprayers, \$1.65; carpenters, \$1.85; plumbers, \$2.00; electricians, \$2.00; bricklayers, \$2.85; plasterers, \$2.35; cement finishers, \$1.65; welders, \$1.85; truck drivers, \$1.50.

Dr. McNeill stated that these will be in effect for all schools, highway work, bridge work, public works, senior citizens' homes, homes for special care, housing under P.E.I. housing authority and construction projects assisted by the provincial government or crown corporations.

Two Vehicles In Collision
