

# Habs Shut Out Leafs 3-0; Red Wings Shade Bruins

MONTREAL (CP) — Masked goalie Jacques Plante Thursday night racked up his first shutout of the National Hockey League season and two goals by Phil Goyette and another by Dick Moore gave Montreal Canadiens 3-0 win over Toronto Maple Leafs.

The victory lengthened to 11 an undefeated string by the NHL leaders and kept them five points ahead of Detroit Red Wings.

Detroit's win in Boston, coupled with Toronto's loss, broke a ree-way tie for second place. The Leafs and Canadiens put up a spirited battle before a crowd of 14,296 and wide open play predominated.

The Montrealers had an edge in play, outshooting the Leafs 33-33, but were given great support by several who had to come to the plate with spectacular saves the last period to preserve his shutout.

### ONLY SIX PENALTIES

Both clubs skated all out and kept close and hard checking were only six minor penalties, three to each team. None figured in the scoring.

Goyette scored his first goal at 2:23 of the first period when he pulled out enough on Claude Provost's rebound to allow the Montreal centre to get the puck past him.

A sharp deflection of Andre Pronovost's shot gave Goyette his second at 19:23 of the second period—his fourth goal in Montreal's last two games.

Moore scored the final goal at 9:21 of the last period from a few feet outside the crease on Henri Richard's perfect passout.

BOSTON (AP) — Jack McIntyre's second goal enabled Detroit to edge Boston Bruins 7-5 Thursday night after the Red Wings were three goals behind.

The victory kept Detroit in second place in the National Hockey League and knocked the Bruins out of a deadlock for that position.

The Bruins held a three-goal advantage midway through the second period Gordie Howe's seventh tally of the season and the sixth for both teams in the wild 20-minute span started the Red Wings on the way back.

McIntyre collected his first goal of the season at 1:44 of the final period when he slipped in Gary Aldcorn's pass. Billy McNeill tied it 5-5 at 11:27 when he lifted a second rebound over felled Bruins' goalie Don Simmons.

The deciding score by McIntyre came at 18:12 when he knocked home a short backhand from in front.

Guy Gendron, with two goals, plus Leo Labine, Johnny Bucyk and Leo Boivin ran up a 5-2 lead for the Bruins. Goalie Terry Sawchuk turned in a fine 38-save performance but his defence was caught napping consistently in the middle session.

Some of Sawchuk's best efforts were needed to keep Bronco Horvath, the cage's top goalgetter, from getting his 16th goal as in many contests though Horvath assisted Bucyk.

# Warwicks Poland Bound To Teach Canadian Hockey

MONTREAL (CP) — The Warwick brothers of Western Canada leave for Poland today to teach the finer points of Canadian hockey, something many people have often accused them of not practicing.

Grant, Bill and Dick Warwick were roundly roasted by Canada's own sportswriters after the brothers led the Penticon Vs to a slam-bang victory in the world hockey championships of 1955. They were charged with playing crude, battleship hockey and ruining Canada's reputation abroad.

Europeans apparently see things differently. No other Canadian championship team has been so consistently remembered or admired over there.

### ANSWER TO CRITICS

"This should answer our critics," Bill said Thursday, waving

a copy of a letter inviting the Warwicks to join the Kaowice, Poland, team for a month; to hold coaches' clinics and to tour Poland and perhaps West Germany.

The brothers leave today aboard the Polish liner Batory. They will coach and play for the Katowice amateur team, teach coaches and managers from all parts of Poland, and tour Poland playing exhibitions for Katowice. One game in Warsaw will be against the Polish national team, which the Vs faced 6-0 in a rough game at Krefeld, Germany, during the 1955 tourney.

"The Europeans can be good hockey players if they're taught to play the game the way it's played here," Grant said. "We want to teach them the clutch-and-grab game isn't the system.

Good, clean, hard body-checks are better."

"They can skate and they're always in good physical condition. They can teach us a thing or two about conditioning, but we can teach them how to play the game."

Katowice, the largest mining centre in Europe, has one of Poland's top amateur teams. Several of its graduates go each year to the Polish national team.

George Brodzki, former newspaper official of Katowice, started the tour when he wrote to the Warwicks asking for autographed pictures. The resulting correspondence ended in the Warwicks being invited to come in person.

Grant plays right wing and has played defence. Dick is a centre and Bill a leftwing. They will coach in their specialties with Bill also teaching goalkeepers.

# Ingo Talks Of Title Bout Against Floyd Patterson

NEW YORK (AP)—Both Ingemar Johansson and his adviser, Edwin Ahlquist, are talking about a heavyweight title defence against ex-champ Floyd Patterson in New York.

In Miami, Fla., the man who holds the contract for the rematch, Vincent Velella, is talking about suing the champ if he doesn't go through with the match that he now plans to stage March 1 in Miami's Orange Bowl.

Johansson said Thursday he still preferred to fight Patterson in his first defence. However, he

added he was ready to fight anybody.

"Yes, I hope to fight Patterson," he said. "If this is not possible, I will fight anybody. I would prefer to fight next spring in New York."

Johansson said he does not care who promotes "as long as he is clean."

### NEW PROMOTION OUTFIT

There have been reports that a new promotional outfit, headed by Joe Tepper, a former official of the New York State Athletic

Commission, hoped to take over the promotion by buying out Velella and his associates in Rosensohn Enterprises, Inc. The Rosensohn Corporation had its New York license revoked last week by the New York Commission for alleged irregularities in connection with the June 26 title fight between Johansson and Patterson at Yankee Stadium.

Both Johansson and Ahlquist minimized the possibility of Ingemar boxing Archie Moore, the light heavy champ, before Patterson. Both, however, said he could be in the picture.

"Archie Moore would, of course, be a good opponent for Ingemar," said Ahlquist in Sweden. "I don't doubt for a moment but that Ingemar would defeat Archie. Archie Moore is quite a different boxer than Floyd. But whether it is Patterson or Moore, I am convinced that the match will be held in New York."

back on hand to bring the birds back in a few years when hunting them will have the semblance of sport and not just plain hard sleddin'. If we only have an average of two coveys to a school District, and I feel confident the average is higher, that will give us a minimum of fifteen thousand Huns. Remember we started them off with 10 pairs and this was later increased to 50 pairs. It strikes me that some sort of epidemic was the cause of last season's breeding flock left over from the hunting season not either doubling or tripling the 1959 Hun population.

### DECLINE

Our pheasants also underwent decline in population this season compared to last. Personally I take a very dim view of the current pheasant re-stocking program. Letting out pheasant eggs to farmers to raise under hens and then liberating the hatch throughout the province could be the means of inoculating our wild stock with a deadly virus.

Our biologists warn us against such a practice as pheasants are prone to all diseases effecting domestic poultry. This is quite natural for our domestic poultry was developed from the wild pheasants. If our Hun and pheasant population shows a further decline in 1960 we are in for trouble and our formerly top upland game bird hunting will be definitely be out. It's nothing short of sheer foolishness to blame hunting for the present low cobb and imported game birds have been reared. Our native partridge (Ruffed grouse) are still on the upward trend.

I have been asked my opinion and advice on the upland game bird situation and here it is: Cut out the October 1st season. Lump the three, Huns, pheasants and grouse together and have the season open on October 15 and close on November 15 and leave the daily bag limits as is. If the current decline continues after 1960 it's time to take real drastic action or let our "import" go by the board. The open season on upland game birds as outlined as several attractive features. It will eliminate the scruffy, immature coveys of Huns and pheasants that hunters encounter early in October and a real headache will be removed from the first two weeks of our harvest. Harvesting early potatoes and turnips, threshing and harvesting grain etc. I feel certain the majority of our "import" farmers will utter a fervent "Amen" to such a move. What about the Non-Resident hunters? Do I hear someone ask? Let them take it or leave it is the answer. The welfare of our game and co-operation with our farmers takes precedence over all others so far as this "Million acre farm" is concerned.

# Ticats Have Plans For Rough Riders

HAMILTON (AP)—Are Hamilton Tiger-Cats planning another surprise for Ottawa Rough Riders in Saturday's opening of the Big Four football finals?

It looks like it, though it may be only a small one this time. A year ago Ticats startled Riders in the first game of the two-game total-points final with their "lonely Faloney" offence. This roughly consisted of placing quarterback Bernie Faloney all alone in the backfield to start his attack.

If there's a new play brewing for Saturday it's more likely to be a running manoeuvre.

Coach Jim Trimble has been switching his line formations during training workouts this week, looking for some new punch in the running game.

WORKING ON RUSHING  
"We will have the best rushing we've had this season," he said after Wednesday night's workout. "We have been working on our rushing for two weeks and I know it will work."

There's no indication yet of any radical change in the usual Ticat tactics. All-star John Barrow has been shifted from left guard to right tackle, filling a

hole left by the injured Bronko Nagurski. Ernie Danjean has gone into Barrow's old slot.

Those changes, plus extra blocking assignments for ends Paul Dekker and Harry Lampman, are expected to give the Ticats improved power by adding blocking where none was before.

Trimble is juggling his basic line formation in a bid to open up his runners and strike for that first touchdown which he considers all-important in a crucial game like Saturday's.

Second game of the series is slated here Nov. 21.
