**New Brunswick Becoming Wettest "Dry" Province**

FREDERICTON (CP) — New Brunswick is fast earning a reputation as Canada's wettest "dry" province.

Sale of beer or liquor by the glass in taverns, hotels, restaurants or cocktail lounges is prohibited. But for a price or through friends-in-the-know, a tourist or resident can spend an evening in the bar of a "privileged club" with little worry of a police raid.

A call for investigation of the situation by a royal commission was made in the legislature at the last session by a Progressive Conservative, R. Gordon L. Fairweather from Rothesay, a suburb of Saint John. No action was taken, although a newspaper survey of six members from each side of the house had earlier produced the view that an inquiry would receive unanimous approval.

**SAS WIDE POWERS**

The commissioner of the New Brunswick liquor control board has wide powers. He governs the 41 provincial sales outlets that gross close to \$18,000,000 yearly and earned the government a net profit of \$6,000,000 in 1954.

The commissioner is empowered "to do all such things as deemed necessary" to administer the provincial liquor act. He may alter court sentences and authorize search of suspected premises without a warrant.

One highly-placed government source commented: "The situation is deplorable, but I guess it will just have to wait until after the next election"—probably in 1956.

Bootlegging has been prevalent, but critics of the liquor act direct many of their objections at so-called "privileged clubs" operated by social, fraternal, veterans' and sports groups.

Most are open to "members" during afternoons and evenings and are free from police raids if they stick to serving drinks and avoid

violation of gambling or vice laws. When asked how the unlicensed clubs continue to operate, authorities usually decline any comment.

**TROUBLE ENOUGH**

A liquor control board spokesman said: "We've got enough trouble without you newspaper men trying to stir up more."

Officials of the RCMP and the attorney-general's department refer reporters to the board.

One United Church presbytery has called for an inquiry into the liquor laws because private clubs "have made a farce of the liquor act."

A move to combat bootlegging in Saint John, the province's biggest city, was launched at the request of the common council, after a nightly series of raids had failed to stop traffic.

One liquor store is allowed to remain open daily until 10 p.m., instead of the usual 6 p.m. closing time. On Saturdays, the store is open until 11.

The trial has apparently paid off. A Saint John city councillor at a meeting of the council quoted a bootlegger as saying he had to lay off two employees because business

**New Moroccan Era Promised**

PARIS (Reuters) — Ex-sultan Mohammed Ben Youssef broke a two-year silence Tuesday and in a message to Moroccans said a new era is opening "which will mark a turning point in the history of our people."

Ben Youssef's message of "hope, wisdom and reconciliation" was sent after a two-hour meeting with French Foreign Minister Antoine Pinay. The former sultan returned to France Monday from two years in exile after being deposed from the Moroccan throne in 1953 by the French.

Pinay, in a simultaneous statement, said Ben Youssef, who is expected to return to the throne soon, had shown a sincere desire for understanding in the talks which "opens the happiest prospects for the future of Franco-Moroccan relations."

The sultan, who was deposed because of his outspoken nationalist views, said his most important duty is to "respond to the appeal of our people." This was taken to be a reference to recent mass demonstrations in Moroccan cities for his return to the throne at Rabat.
