THE TWELVE MINISTERIAL CESARS.

Rome had her twelve Cæsars, and under their denomination began "the decline and fall of the empire." England may not, indeed, boast of such lofty spirits at the head of her Government; but she now exhibits to the world twelve statesmen who have most unequivocally established their claim to *The Twelve Cæsars*—and here they are, as pretty a muster as ever Ambition, Avarice, and Democracy, counted amongst their adherents, advocates, and agents:

1. Lord Grey, who has seized to himself and his family 150,000l per annum of the public treasure.

2. Lord Brougham, who, under the plausible pretext of reforming the laws, has seized upon more patronage than any of his predecessors ever possessed; and moreover, seized upon an additional 3,000l per annum to his retiring pension.

3. Lord Plunkett, the Irish Chancellor, who has seized 30,000l. per annum for himself and his "ten little Plunketts."

4. Lord Palmerston, the turn-coat Tory, who has seized upon 5,000l. for himself, and 6,000l. per annum for the Ambassadorial emoluments of his honourable brother.

5. Lord Durham, who has seized 2,500l per annum for his sinecure services as Lord Privy Seal; and 30,000l. for his commission to the Court of St. Petersburg; and countless advantages from the conduct manœuvring of the ministry.

6. Lord Melbourne, who seized 6,000l. per annum for his own Home services, 25,000l per annum for his brother George as Sub-Sec. and 10,000 per annum for his brother Sir F. Lamb, as Ambassador to the Court at Vienna.

7. Lord Goderich who has seized 5000l for so mismanaging the Colonies as to endanger their separation from the mother country.

8. Lord Auckland, who has seized 5,000l per annum as Master of the Mint and President of the Board of Trade, with the pensions of 3,000 per annum, and two-thirds sinecures besides.

9. Lord Holland, who has seized 4,000l per annum as Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster—the sinecure services he performs at Holland House.

10. Lord Althorp, who has seized 5,000l per annum for his services in rendering the national accounts unintelligible, and the national revenue unproductive.

11. Sir J. Graham, who has seized 5,000l
