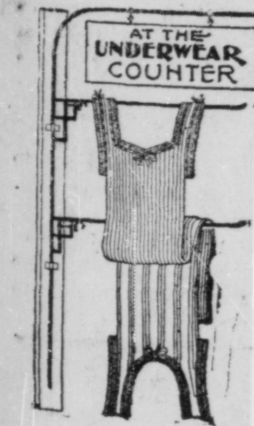

ALEXANDER MARTIN, OPPOSITION CANDIDATE FOR EAST QUEEN'S.

Mr. A. Martin was born at Springton, P. E. I., in March, 1842, and was educated at the common schools and Prince of Wales College. He is a farmer and carries on a mercantile business at Valleyfield, P. E. I. He has been in business since 1870.  
 Among the Island Province's leading and progressive men he was elected to the P. E. Island legislature in 1884 and in 1887. In the last general election he was returned to the House of Commons for the County of Queen's, East, and has now been unanimously nominated for re-election.

Mr. Martin is a gentleman of keen foresight and excellent judgment. He was one of the earnest advocates of railway extension in P. E. Island, especially the Belfast and Murray Harbor Railway.

While the local interests were under his watchful eye he also took an early and prominent place on questions of Imperial import. He is a strong advocate of mutual preferential trade between Canada and other British possessions and the Mother Country. As long ago as 1888 he put himself on record by introducing the following resolution in the Legislative Council of P. E. Island on precisely the same lines as advocated by the Conservative party to-day:

"Resolved, that in view of the repeated refusals of the United States of America to enter into a Reciprocal Treaty with the Dominion of Canada it is advisable that negotiations should be opened with Imperial Parliament to discuss and arrange terms, whereby

British productions should be admitted into British colonies at a lower rate of duty than that imposed on the products of foreign countries and that colonial products should have an advantage extended to them in the markets of Great Britain by placing differential duties on the productions of foreign countries, and that in the meantime the Dominion Government should exert themselves to extend closer commercial relations with the West Indies and other colonial possessions."

This resolution was voted down by the Liberal party, who thus are also on record as opponents of mutual preferential trade the first time it was brought before a Canadian representative body.

He strongly favours the admission of Newfoundland into the Canadian Confederation and brought the matter before the House of Commons in 1898 and 1900. His speeches on both those occasions are worth careful perusal. Taken in connection with his perseverance and ability in presenting on the floor of Parliament the claims of his native province in regard to railway extension, he is certainly entitled to the respect and gratitude of the people.

Mr. Martin's long experience in public life, originality of thought and force of character make him a prominent figure in Canadian politics. His name has already been spoken of in connection with probable changes when the Conservative party attain power as they doubtless will in the approaching election.

### CHAMBERLAIN'S ENEMIES

Make Additional Charges—Alleged Incriminating Letter.

LONDON, Oct. 13.—The attacks upon Mr. Chamberlain have increased in bitterness and malignant spirit. The closing speeches of the Liberal canvass are directed mainly against him; and Labouchere's deliberate charge that Abel Thomas, member for Carmarthen, held incriminating letters, and would have read them if Cecil Rhodes had been attacked by him, is repeated in the opposition press.

Mr. Hawkesly has denied the charge from a Liberal platform, but Labouchere is not satisfied, and is attempting to force Thomas to arraign Mr. Chamberlain.

Mr. Rhodes has, however, greatly improved his reputation by striking the right key in his address in South Africa, and there are signs of impatience over the persistence with which Mr. Chamberlain is attacked.

Lord Salisbury is invariably drawn toward his associates when they are under fire, and Chamberlain is well nigh certain to command the Prime Minister's support.

### EMPRESS FREDERICK

Illness Reaches the Acute Stage—A Specialist Called.

KROONBERG, Oct. 13.—The court marshal of the Dowager Empress Frederick, announces that Her Majesty's illness has reached an acute stage during the last few days, but that, in the opinion of her medical attendants her condition may shortly be ameliorated.

Professor Reavers, of Berlin, has been summoned to attend her.

Considerable alarm is felt at the British Embassy over the condition of the Dowager Empress Frederick. A fortnight ago it was not expected that she would survive the winter.

Professor Reavers, who was summoned suddenly to Kroonberg, is a specialist in kidney disease, but it is understood that Her Majesty's heart is also affected.

The Princess Christian Schleswig Holstein was hurriedly summoned to her bedside yesterday.

### ABOUT CHINA,

Chinese Minister Moves—Official Contradiction—Admiral Ho Pursues the Rebels.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 13.—The Chinese minister here has left town. It is believed that he has gone to the Crimea to see the Czar.

BERLIN, Oct. 13.—An official contradiction has been issued concerning the report that an invasion of Tsang Ting province is contemplated.

HONG KONG, Oct. 13.—Admiral Ho is pursuing the rebels in a northeastern direction from Shang Chang.

The British expedition, consisting of 22,000 of the Bombay infantry, with artillery, is going to Koo Loon, Hinterland, though the district is reported quiet.

### GREAT DAMAGE

Twelve Schooners Sunk and Ashore at Sydney.

NORTH SYDNEY, N. S. Oct. 12.—A terrific southeast gale struck here at seven o'clock last night doing great damage to shipping.

Twelve schooners are damaged ashore and sunk in this port (as follows: Challenge, Langarville and Carlous, of Newfoundland are ashore; Canadian, Cymbeline, Wilfrid, Guy, Rhuma and Winged Arrow, of Nova Scotia, are ashore; Union, of Sydney is sunk with cargo of salt at the wharf and broke up; also Candid, of St. John, sunk with cargo of flour.)

The Henry Ellsworth is considerably damaged about the stern, but the cargo is safe.

Grave fears about the Palmoo's safety. She sailed at four o'clock yesterday with a full cargo.
