There was a sudden flash, white hot at the centre. It subsided as quickly as a photographer's flash bulb, but a red glow persisted.

Then, like a genie's trail, a grey column of smoke shot upward and outward. It climbed hundreds of feet into the sky and erupted into the large mushroom usually associated with atomic explosion. The mushroom was purple. From its centre in one continuing swirl of smoke rose what looked like a purple doughnut.

The base column of grey was perhaps a half-mile wide in a few minutes of the actual blast.

The column — with little help from wind — then began stretching at both ends and bent at two points. Within 10 minutes, it assumed a twisted Z shape.

The lower section was grey, the diagonal bar turned brown and the top section glowed pink-purple.

The "Z" spread lazily. Fifteen minutes after the blast, it could have easily measured two miles from one point of the diagonal bar to the other.

The figure was by this time drifting several thousand feet into the air. The top bar was well above my eye level, 8,000 feet up.

It took well over an hour for the cloud to dissipate.

also contained formal notice that the old treaties giving the United Kingdom rights in the Suez and the Sudan have been scrapped by Egypt.

Other Developments

These other developments in the British — Egyptian dispute look like:

1. The Sudan Legislative Assembly, elected under British supervision in 1948, voted down union with Egypt.

2. Gen. Sir George Erskine, British garrison commander in the Suez Canal zone, said he hoped there would be no clash with Egyptian troops and pointedly warned "We are stronger than ever."

3. Egypt, in her note to the British Embassy, rejected a British claim for damages from rioting at Port Said and Ismailia on Oct. 16, and entered a third series of protests regarding alleged incidents in the canal area in the last few days.

ected, the new Prime Minister will begin to re-draw the pattern made by the socialists.

The people look to that time with a feeling of foreboding. They expect explosions in and out of the House of Commons.

How will this affect Britain's two greatest problems?

In terms of foreign relations, probably not very much.

The cloud of anxiety that hung over the campaigning — the fear of war as a result of a strong Churchillian line of policy — still exists today. But if threats do develop in the Middle East, or elsewhere, the immense patriotism of the British people, and their ability to close ranks in the face of an enemy, will quickly become manifest.

Another Major Problem

The other major problem — a developing economic crisis — is considered more dangerous by reason of the deep political cleavage in the country today.

Britain's dollar reserves dropped by \$288,000,000 during the third quarter of 1951.

In his electioneering, Churchill promised no quick cures. In fact, he almost repeated his wartime "blood-tears-sweat" forecast on the economic battle.

He had the complete backing of the whole British nation in the war. He does not have it today.

In Trinity United Church, Summerside, yesterday morning and last evening Rev. K. G. Sullivan, M.A., B.D. preached his farewell sermons to capacity congregations.

In the morning his text was based on the text found in Corinthians 12-9 "My grace is sufficient for thee" in the evening he based his remarks on Ephesians 6-13 "and having done all to stand" following a thought provoking address he concluded by saying "When troubles arise, do all that is humanly possible then stand and let God do the rest."

The choir led the congregations in the hymns of praise with Miss Mary Geldart as organist.

In the evening the hymns sung were "Spirit Divine Attend Our Prayer," "All The Way My Savior Leads Me," "When I Survey The Wondrous Cross."

The morning anthem was "Still With Thee" with Constable H. Brooks taking the solo part. In the evening F. R. L. Emery effectively rendered the vocal solo "Two Little Words" (goodbye). The anthem sung was "He Lives."

Withdraw Charges Against Jockeys

WELLAND, Ont., Oct. 27 (CP)—The Crown today withdrew charges of conspiracy against two jockeys and two jockey agents charged in connection with alleged "fixes" at Fort Erie race track during the summer.

Jockeys Robert Wankmuller of Newark, N. J., and Phil Marchese, Pawtucket, R. I., were cleared along with Henry Dunne, Brooklyn, N. Y., and Billy Michaels, Buffalo, N. Y., and two agents.

A third jockey, Donald Cox of Hamilton, had a perjury charge dismissed today because of lack of evidence when he appeared in a Toronto court.

Special crown prosecutor Joseph Sedgwick of Toronto said he was withdrawing the charges against the four men who appeared here because of lack of evidence.

A charge of conspiracy against Harry Swartz, Toronto, alleged "contact man" in the case, will be heard later.

Churchill Announces Makeup Of New Cabinet

LONDON, Oct. 27 (CP)— Winston Churchill announced today that Anthony Eden will become Foreign Minister in Britain's new Conservative Conservative Government.

Churchill, whose Conservative Government, unseated Labor in Thursday's general election, moved quickly to form a cabinet "in view of the critical foreign and economic situation."

In addition to Foreign Minister, a post Eden held during the war years under Churchill, the de-bonair No. 2 man in the Conservative Party will be Deputy Prime Minister and leader of the House of Commons.

Churchill also announced that in addition to being Prime Minister he would keep for himself the vital Defence Ministry.

A deputy leader of the House of Commons will be appointed to help Eden. This would give him more time to devote to the Foreign Office.

Other cabinet appointments in the new Conservative Government: Lord Woolton, 68, lord president of the council with responsibility for food and agriculture.

Richard Austen Butler, 42, chancellor of the exchequer. Oliver Lyttelton, 53, colonial secretary.

Sir Walter Monckton, 60, minister of labor. Sir David Maxwell Fyfe, 51, home secretary and minister for Welsh affairs.

Marquess of Salisbury, 58, lord privy seal and leader of the House of Lords. Lord Ismay, 68, secretary for Commonwealth relations.

Lord Ismay and Monckton also were appointed to the Privy Council. The appointments were made after King George approved them at a special meeting of the Privy Council at Buckingham Palace.

The fill only the top jobs in the cabinet, which under Clement Attlee's Labor Government had 70 posts.

The appointments are effective immediately because of the critical foreign and economic situation faced by Britain.

The announcements came shortly after Churchill called his chief lieutenant to his bedroom and plunged into the work of being the country's new Prime Minister.

The 76-year-old statesman worked until dawn, snatching only a few hours sleep, and was awake again, refreshed, at 8 a. m.
