A VORACIOUS HEIFER.—A heifer, the property of a resident of the eastern end of the city, shuffled off this mortal coil rather suddenly, a few weeks ago. The carcass was carted to the shore and there laid to rest. Many were the conjectures as to the cause of death, but the mystery is now, apparently, solved. A few evenings ago a couple of men who were strolling along the shore found in the place where the heifer had been laid a miscellaneous collection of indigestibles such as pieces of stovepipe, remnants of coats, pants and vests, and several other articles too numerous to mention. Whether some junk store had been wrecked there, or whether the poor unsophisticated heifer, in the absence of more suitable material to operate upon, had undertaken to "get outside" of the aforesaid collection, we are not prepared to say.

A GENTLEMAN who attended the entertainment of the Emerson Grand Concert Company, and who has nothing to gain by the statement, says it is, in his opinion, the best troupe that ever came to America. Mrs. Carter, he says, has a wonderful soprano voice—one of the best ever heard in America—while Emerson was pronounced by Gilmore to be the best cornet player in the world. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] The Hanlan-Kennedy Race. BOSTON, May 31. The Hanlan Kennedy race, at Point of Pines, was postponed on account of rough water. It will, if the weather permits, take place this evening, at four o'clock.

A Disastrous Stampede—10 or 15 Persons Killed. NEW YORK, May 31. A stampede occurred on the new Brooklyn Bridge yesterday. Ten or fifteen persons were killed and a large number were wounded.

An Agricultural Bill. LONDON, May 31. In the House of Commons passed the English Agricultural Bill yesterday. The bill authorizing the Irish local authorities to improve Irish laborers' dwellings was reported agreed to in committee.

New Guinea and Queensland. LONDON, May 31. Lord Derby has refused to allow the annexation of New Guinea by Queensland but he will allow the erection of British stations along the coast.

A Choice. ROME, May 31. The "Journal de Rome" says that France must choose between a rupture with the Vatican and breaking with atheistical radicalism.

Telegraph Notes. About 2,000 troops have embarked at Toulon for Tonquin. British sloop of war Dragon has left Aden for Tamatoo, Madagascar.

It is reported that the Nihilists are preparing a manifesto in reply to that of the Czar. Alarming reports cabled concerning the health of the Queen have caused some excitement.

Mr. Chapleau has left Montreal again for the South. It is said that he only came to Ottawa to save his seat. The French Government has informed the son of Abd El Kadir that it will pay the expenses of his father's funeral.

Captain Hosea Ballou, aged 90 years yesterday, the oldest Freemason in the United States, died of senile debility, on the 29th. Count Zacharoff, agent of the Allan steamship line at Galway, has received a letter threatening him with death unless he quits the city.

A fund of over \$10,000 has been raised among the French-Canadians of Montreal for the widow of Delormier, who was hanged in 1837 for participation in the rebellion. A brother of John Dunn, of Zululand fame, who arrived at Megantic, P. Q., from Scotland, a few weeks ago, was accidentally killed yesterday by a pile of wood falling on him.

A terrific tornado passed over Fort Smith, Arkansas, on the 29th, unroofing houses, blowing down shade trees and carrying away fences. The Southern Hotel was unroofed.

Both Hanlan and Kennedy are in splendid condition. A large number of sporting men from different parts of the country are on hand. Both men are confident of winning, and if no postponement occurs, the race will be rowed on its merits about 5 p. m. The referee will probably be selected at noon to-morrow, from six well-known sporting men. Betting is 5 to 2 in favor of Hanlan.

The Emperor and Empress of Russia have received the congratulations of the civil and military officials, mayors of cities and members of the nobility. Lord Wolseley, representative of the British army, and Gen. Von Werder, German military envoy, attended the reception. Monsignor Vennutelli, papal nuncio, was presented to their majesties. Gen. Von Schwenitz, German Ambassador, will give a banquet to the German Princes this evening.

A double tornado swept by Clay City, Indiana, on the 29th. The extremities were a mile apart. At Meal's mill a house was swept out of existence and six persons killed. A bridge was also destroyed and general havoc ensued. In a little settlement on the other side of its track five persons were killed, several houses blown to pieces and one child blown away. In all twelve persons were injured besides those killed. Trees are blown down over a wide area.

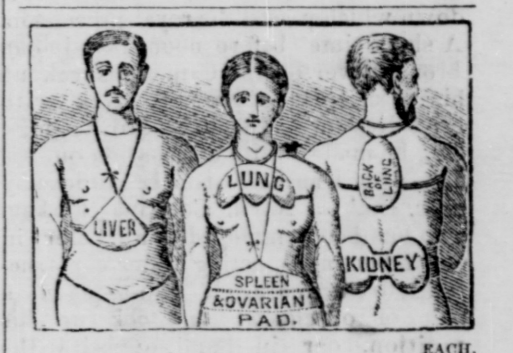
