New Brunswick Election

The Government Sustained.

STANDING OF THE PARTIES.

Blair Among the Defeated.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 24.

The provincial elections were held on Saturday. Returns from all parts of the province are sufficiently complete to show the standing of the parties to be: Opposition, 14; Government, 25. In the latter are included three Independents, which the Opposition claim, and also one seat in Carleton, which is in dispute.

There is great surprise in York, where Premier Blair and his whole ticket fell, Blair himself being 259 votes behind the lowest man of the Opposition side.

In St. John city Stockton, Alward, Shaw and Smith, Opposition, have all been returned, and McKeown, Opposition, and Dunn, Government, have been returned for the county.

Another New Disease.

QUARANTINE, NEW YORK, Oct. 24.

Capt. Durkee, of the Nova Scotia barque H. B. Cann, from Judo, reports Sept. 23rd Thomas Russell, beamman, died of beriberi on Oct. 8th. John Nugent, carpenter, died of the same disease. Both were buried at sea. On her arrival at Hampton Roads the mate and seven men were sent to the hospital. The disease is causing much alarm among health authorities at quarantine. It is imported from Japan and is unknown here.

Sudden Death.

TRURO, Oct. 24.

On Saturday morning, at 3 o'clock, Murdoch Haley, laborer, was awakened by the crying of the baby. Haley then called his wife and receiving no answer he snuck her and was horrified to find that she was dead. Heart disease was the cause of death.

The Viola Donkin in Trouble

VINEYARD HAVEN, Mass., Oct. 24.

The schooner Viola Donkin, from New York for Charlottetown, parted her chain on Nantucket Shoals on the night of the 20th, during a northwest gale, and dragged on the beach. She is now taking in a miscellaneous freight and will sail about five this afternoon.

Mr. Schrieber, in an interview, stated that the work of boring the Norumberland Strait tunnel has been suspended owing to the weather. Ten test borings were made.

Village Swept Away.

CAGLIARI, Italy, Oct. 24.

The village of San Spirato has been swept away by flood, and it is estimated that not less than 200 villagers were drowned.
