In all Canada carried off sixteen diplomas of honor, ninety-one gold medals, seventy silver medals, fifteen bronze medals and fourteen honorable mentions; thus securing the proud position of receiving a larger number of awards than any other country represented at the exhibition, excepting Jamaica.

**The English Census.**

The census returns lately published show that there are now 62 towns in England and Wales with a population exceeding 50,000. London has 4,211,056, Liverpool 517,951, Manchester 605,343 and Birmingham 429,171. Liverpool is not growing fast, the decline in its rate of increase being 6 per cent. It is interesting to note that England and Wales contain 72.8 per cent. of nearly three-quarters of the total population of Great Britain and Ireland, that Ireland contains 12.5, or one-eighth of the whole, and Scotland 10.7 per cent. The census again brings out the interesting fact that the proportion of females to males continues to increase, there being now 14,950,542 females to 14,050,340 males, an inequality probably due in a measure to the large emigration of the sex most able to seek new fields of activity. There are 6,146,900 families in the country, an increase of 513,708, or over 9 per cent. in the ten years, a rate not equal to the total growth of population, but still satisfactory, and the number of inhabited houses has increased by 621,183, or 12.9 per cent. Of course, the increase of population is not spread equally over the country, and a marked feature of the census is the decrease in the rural and agricultural districts. In 13 counties there are decreases, comprising 261 registration areas, the increase being confined almost entirely to the cities and towns.

The population of England and Wales on the night of April 5 last was 29,001,018, an increase of 3,026,572, or over 11 per cent., upon the figures of 1881; and this, be it remembered, was achieved in the face of an enormous and steady emigration. During the ten years 3,552,952 persons have emigrated from the United Kingdom, of whom no less than 1,571,856 were English people; so that the actual increase of the race in the decade has been almost 5½ millions. This fact coupled with the nearly stationary condition of the population of France is a satisfactory evidence that England will more than maintain her position relatively to the other nations of Europe.

**Executions by Electricity.**

The new law of the State of New York, for the execution of criminals by the electrical current, instead of by hanging, was enforced for the second time on the 7th of July, upon the bodies of four murderers. The execution took place at the Sing Sing State prison. The death in each case was instantaneous and painless. There can be no question of the superiority of this mode of inflicting the death penalty over the rope system. The attending surgeons were two eminent doctors, namely, Dr. Carlos F. MacDonald and Dr. B. Ward. In their official report to the warden, they give the following particulars:—"First—All of the condemned walked into the execution room unrestrained, with firmness and without assistance, seated themselves in turn in the electric chair without the slightest protest or resistance, and quietly submitted to the adjustment of the retaining straps and the electrodes.

"Second—In each case unconsciousness was produced instantaneously by the closure of the circuit, was complete, and persisted without interruption until the heart's action had entirely ceased and death had certainly occurred. In each case death was manifestly painless.

"Third—In compliance with the statute, an autopsy was made in each case, as soon as practicable, by Dr. Ira T. Van Gieson, of New York, in our presence and under our supervision, with the result of revealing the same gross changes in the blood and tissues previously observed in cases of death by the action of strong electric current.

"In concluding, allow us to congratulate you on the completeness, in all their details, of all your preliminary arrangements, on the uniform good order and decorum which prevailed during the trying ordeal, and on the resulting demonstration of the rapidity and painlessness of this method of inflicting the death penalty. The experience of to-day has proved to our satisfaction that this method is superior to any other yet devised."

## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

**Grit Bungling and Incapacity.**

SIR,—The travelling public would like to know, (if there be any one who can tell), why the bridge, known as Roger's bridge, on Dunk River stream, in Lot 26, has been up now close on three weeks, while the specification says "it must not be up for more than six days." Such a state of affairs is too bad. We would certainly expect better from the powers that be, managing of affairs for so short a time. Again we understand that the said specification states that the mud sills are to be placed level with the bottom of streams. Instead of this we are informed that they are not within three feet of the place called for a specification. Now, we would like to know why this is so, and if it is the way the Grits propose managing the affairs of this Province? The sooner the people see and realize such glaring incapacity, the better for themselves. When we consider, in the first place, the rascality the Government displayed in awarding the tender for this bridge to a pettifogger Grit, whose tender was considerably higher than that of another—whose politics they were not sure of, already exposed in your columns, we must condemn the Government. Why does not the Commissioner of Public Works call around now and see these works? He seemed to be very energetic during the late election in the First District of Queen's County. Why this extraordinary lull? If he has too much on hand to attend to at present, why not send the newly appointed engineer, Mr. Callaghan to pronounce upon it? It is all very fine to suit into the hands of their friends to play the convenience of Mr. Burris, the contractor, and put money into the pocket of Mr. Drummond the inspector. But the travelling public will not tolerate such much longer,—and why should they? For our part we consider the Government erred in not continuing with Mr. Murphy as inspector of this bridge. It was a mistake to cancel his appointment, as they will find him "a hard man to feed." Seeing that he failed in securing the superintendence for townships 27 and 28, we are at a loss to know what they have to give him now in the absence of more bridge building. It has been his ambition for some years past to get the inspecting of bridges in his locality. If the Government wish to command the confidence of the public they must not pander to the whims of hungry Grit office-seekers, or if they do, their inquiries will follow them and their sins will find them out.

**Campbell's Cove Breakwater.**

Last fall's storm carried away the most of the covering and a quantity of ballast. In this exposed condition it has been allowed to remain. Within the last few weeks it has received further injury. Every one in this vicinity knows how valuable it has been in the past as a harbor of refuge for fishing boats, and it is hoped that it will not be allowed to go to ruin as it certainly will if not repaired soon. It cost some thousands of dollars, which will be all lost if something be not done before the heavy northerly gales set in. I hope that our worthy M. **Banished to Siberia.**

A NATURALIZED AMERICAN IS SEIZED BY ORDER OF THE CZAR AND IS SENT TO A LIVING DEATH.

According to a letter received at Omaha, Nev., a few days ago, by Abe Goldstein, a well-known citizen, S. Gerber, who has lived in Omaha for the past five years, has been exiled to Siberia by the Russian authorities. Gerber went last March to Myszyzno, near the German frontier, his native town in Poland, for the purpose of returning with his family, who had remained in the old country. His appearance in the little town excited suspicion, and his arrival soon reached the ears of the authorities. Fearing arrest, Gerber fled across the frontier into the neighboring province. The authorities of the German town in which Gerber had taken refuge turned him over to the emissaries of the Czar, who took him in chains to Myszyzno, where he was tried on a charge of running away to America. Gerber claimed to be a citizen of the United States and showed papers, proving that he was a naturalized citizen; but in spite of this he was sentenced to imprisonment for one year in jail at Lamsey, the capital of the province, and afterward to be banished to Siberia for five years and his property to be confiscated. Geabar had intended to return to Omaha with his family and set up in business.

**A NOVEL CONTEST.**—One of the most novel matches supposed to be in the line of sporting that has been heard of was made in San Francisco a few days ago. It is a snoring contest between Prof. Thos. Clark and Capt. Robert Cleary. The articles of agreement state that the contestants must retire at a stated hour to a room with a very elevated ceiling. The referee will then take charge, and when both men are comfortably stowed away in their little beds "time" will be called. Ten points will be scored in favor of the man who spouts first. Points of from 1 to 10 will be awarded in favor of the competitor who will give the most varied assortment of bawdy calls during the contest, which will terminate when one of the snorers awakens the other from his peaceful slumbers.
