Steel Negotiation Termed 'Farcical'

NEW YORK (AP) — Crucial steel negotiations broke down completely Friday night. Industry leaders spurned an invitation to meet with union president David J. McDonald.

Earlier, McDonald refused to meet further in what he termed "a farcical filibuster" with the steel industry's regular four-man bargaining team, headed by R. Conrad Cooper, U.S. Steel Corporation's executive vice-president.

McDonald, instead, called for a session Friday night with chairman Roger M. Blough of U.S. Steel, and executives of 11 other leading steel companies. This bid was turned down by the company chiefs.

"No useful purpose can possibly be served by changing the present bargaining procedures," the executives replied to McDonald in a telegram.

next Tuesday midnight collapsed. The point blocking such a strike postponement was the union's demand, rejected by the industry, for retroactive effort of any eventual contract gains that might be negotiated.

ROOM FOR ADJUSTMENT

In Washington, Senator Estes Kefauver (Dem. Tenn.) said a study of his Senate anti-monopoly subcommittee of steel industry profit and productivity statistics indicated there is ample room for upward wage adjustments without a price increase.

Also in Washington, director Joseph F. Finnegan of the federal mediation and conciliation service said he knew of no government plan to intervene.

They said Cooper's group had full bargaining authority and stood ready to meet anytime with the union.

The procedural impasse heightened the threat of an industry-wide strike on July 1, only four days from now.

A walkout of 500,000 basic Steelworkers could drive a body blow at the U.S. economy, now recovering from the recession. Efforts to postpone the strike threat have all failed.

The industry began curtailing some operations Friday in anticipation of a walkout. But the major portion of the industry was not planning to start the shutdown process until Sunday or Monday.

MUST OFFER GAINS

McDonald complained further talks were fruitless unless the industry was prepared to offer some contract gains. He said the companies have only talked so far of undermining present contracts due to expire at midnight Tuesday.

The union said it has made two settlement offers, but declined to specify their terms.
