Put Quake Death Toll At 1,400

ORLEANSVILLE, Algeria. (CP)—Vultures wheeled over this earthquake-shattered city Monday as medical teams sprayed disinfectant to prevent the spread of disease from polluted springs and rotting bodies still trapped beneath the ruins.

Meanwhile, an official announcement said the death toll from the quake last week has risen to 1,400 and at least another 60 bodies are believed still under the rubble. Many other dead are expected to be uncovered in outlying villages.

As rescue and medical teams worked, still-shocked inhabitants sat listlessly in the broiling sun watching them.

Hundreds of others already have deserted Orleansville, believing it destroyed beyond repair and destined to become a ghost city.
