P. E. Island Team Captures Barlow Challenge Cup

CONNAUGHT RIFLE RANGE, South March, Ont., Aug. 12—(CP) Prince Edward Island today won the Barlow challenge cup at the 84th annual Dominion of Canada Rifle Association prize shoot on the strength of best pacings on the target.

The four-member team tied with the Royal Canadian School of Infantry, Camp Borden, Ont., and the Governor General's Foot Guards, Ottawa, but was awarded the contest because of placings.

Each team scored 188 of a possible 200.

The match, from the 600-yard range, is open to teams of four officers, or former officers, of the armed services.

A six-man British Columbia team captured the Steinhardt Trophy for provincial tyro teams. They posted a combined score of 286 of a possible 300 from 200 yards to finish one better than P. E. I. and the New Brunswick Rifle Association.

Rookie Righthander Pitches Cardinals To Win

(By The Canadian Press) Stuart Miller, rookie righthander, pitched brilliantly to give St. Louis Cardinals a 1-0 victory over Chicago Cubs Tuesday.

Miller, in his first game in the majors held the Cubs to six hits, walked two men and struck out four to provide the third-place National League team with more pitching strength for the stretch run.

Bob Rush, ace of the Chicago staff, was the victim of Miller's sparkling performance. The rookie was called up from the Cardinals' American Association farm team at Columbus where he had an 11-5 record.

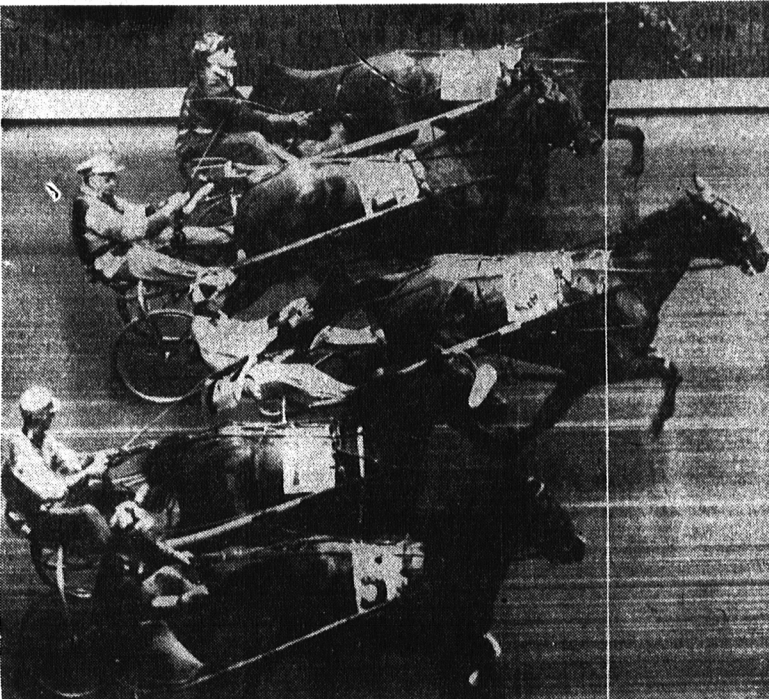

More Than 6,000 Fans Attend Second Night's Program At Big Meet

A big crowd of upwards of 6,000 people last night saw more of the hottest racing seen recently as the Old Home Week program ended its second day. The featured Two Year Old Trot and Pace was won in two straight heats by Bell Hop B. as trainer-driver Len O'Meara fought off all opposing bids to receive the silver plate of the P. E. I. Harness Racing Club from president, Dr. R. F. Seaman.

It was another night of bitter stretch battles and photo finishes as the horsemen fought each heat from wire to wire.

What might have been a serious accident ended happily in the first heat of the night when Flicka MacElwyn, driven by George Sobey, fell in the stretch. He had been trailing Suffolk Chief and coming on fast when the Chief went to a break. Flicka went down on his knees and Mr. Sobey was tossed clear into the infield. However neither he nor the horse appeared seriously injured and both came out for the second heat.

The opening go in the "baby" race saw Bell Hop B take an early lead and hold it all the way to the finish under a stiff drive as they came to the wire. Suffolk Chief took the lead in the second heat and was still in front when they turned for home. But Bell Hop B put on a terrific stretch drive and in the last few yards just managed to get

to the Chief and have the officials call for a photo. He had won it by a short nose.

The 2.25 Trot showed that Anyway had just a bit too much sustained speed for the rest of the field. He won the first and third heats, but had to watch Tartan get the middle one. When the six-horse field got away in the first heat four of the entries broke on the first turn and Anyway won comfortably.

The lead changed frequently in the second go as April Bud held it until she jumped it off and Tartan moved. He stayed there despite the pressure of a hard-driving finish. April Bud again started fast in the final heat but McGregor took Anyway out on the top turn with Tartan and April Bud also putting on drives and the four horses came in together for a rousing finish. Tartan landed in the second slot with Roma Budlong coming in fast to be third.

Some great battles were staged by Dr. J. A. and Ann's Dream in the First Division of the 2.25 Pace as they fought each other from wire to wire. The Dr. turned in a surprise in the opener. Protector's Boy grabbed an early lead and held on under pressure from Ann's Dream who closed fast. However the fast moving Dr. came from nowhere in the stretch to nip both of them in a photo finish.

There was another nerve-tangling finish in the second heat with five horses staging a struggle all the way. Dr. J. A. broke just at the start and had to go all out to get into contention. But at the end he was running over horses as he closed with a terrific burst but just failed to get to Ann's Dream. The final heat demonstrated the speed of the Nova Scotia horse. Protector's Boy again went into a lead and held it through the half and into the backstretch. However, at the three-quarter pole the Dr. made his move and at the end he was going away to win by three lengths.

Plenty more excitement was packed into the Classified Trot as the finish of the first heat saw four horses so close a blanket would have covered them. Prairie Pete started fast and was leading going up the back the second time round, but Rajah Hanover, moving very fast, went ahead and opened up a big lead. But he could not hold it in the driving finish to the wire and both Westpal Girl and Neil Kalmuck passed him.

In the second go of the Trot Guy Harvester made a game bid but lost the half when Neil and Westpal Girl brought the fans up yelling with a duel jammed with speed. They fought right to the wire with only inches between them with the Kelly driven horse winning.

In the Bankers' Match, Chief Petty Officer W. Shorten of the Nova Scotia team and Sgt. R. L. Coles of the Prince Edward Island team tied with scores of 97 of a possible 100 from 300 and 600 yards.

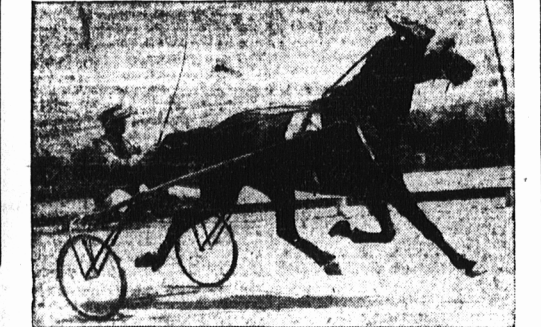

2 Matches Decided At DCRA Shoot Yesterday

CONNAUGHT RIFLE RANGES, South March, Ont., Aug. 12—(CP)—A warrant officer in the Sherbrooke (Que.) regiment today won the Bankers' Match at the 84th annual Dominion of Canada Rifle Association shoot here.

WO2 E. L. Warner put 10 bullets into the black from each of the 300- and 600-yard ranges to score the only perfect card among the 600 marksmen competing in the event.

Warner yesterday tied with two other riflemen with scores of 34 of a possible 35 in the Sherwood Match from 300 yards but was beaten out in the shoot off.

Sgt. R. S. French, 65, of Enfield, England, a member of the British rifle team, scored one off the possible to place second in the Bankers' Match.

A former King's Prize winner and winner of the Lieutenant-Governor's Match at the Ontario Rifle Association Match last week, Sgt. French dropped to an inner four on his first shot and then scored 18 straight bulls-eyes.

Only two matches were shot today, the City of Ottawa Match and the Bankers. Both count in the Grand and All Comers' Aggregate. During the week-long shoot top aggregate standings are added to scores posted in Saturday's final stage of the Governor-General's Match and from this will be chosen Canada's team to travel to Biscay next year.
