

# Saint John Citizens Vote For Water Flouridation

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—W.W. Macaulay, a druggist, was chosen mayor of Saint John Monday in the city's biennial election. He led the poll with 4,370 votes against 2,716 for his only opponent, Ernest W. Patterson, a former mayor. The retiring mayor, Dr. F. B. Peat, did not seek re-election. Three of those who ran with Mr. Macaulay captured the Citizens' Council seats on the common council. They are Councilors W. Gerard Hanley with 4,292 votes; Andrew G. Gunter with 4,180; and Wilfred E. Clarke with 3,968.

The remaining three councilors' seats went to two labor-sponsored candidates, James A. Whitebone,

who received 3,907 votes, and Councilor William K. Craig, 3,845, and one independent, Andrew G. Harrigan, 3,701.

**FAVOR FLOURIDATION**

The Citizens' Council was formed two years ago by groups of citizens to provide "better civic leadership" and its entire slate won election in 1954. Citizens Council candidates defeated Monday were Councilor Harold E. McLean with 3,542 votes, Robert H. Patterson with 3,542 and Reginald G. March with 3,461.

Also defeated were independents John D. MacCallum, 3,512, and Gerald O'Brien, 1,438.

In a plebiscite held in conjunction with the election, votes were 5,411 to 715 in favor of amalgamation with the neighboring city of Lunenburg and 5,286 to 702 in favor of amalgamation with Simonsville parish.

A proposal for adding fluorine to the city's water supply was favored by 3,051 to 2,722.

About 42 per cent of the 16,724 eligible to vote turned out.

## WILL ADDRESS TB LEAGUE

Dr. C.G. Shaver M.B., President of the Canadian Tuberculosis Association and Dr. G.J. Wherrett, M.D. M.R.C.P., F.R.C.P. (C) will be the key speakers at the 18th Annual Meeting of the Prince Edward Island Tuberculosis League, to be held at the Charlottetown Hotel on Thursday, October 18th. Mr. Arthur M. Clark, President of the Prince Edward Island Tuberculosis League, who made the announcement last night, went on to say that people from all parts

of the Island will be in attendance at the meeting where a review of past work done by the League will be presented along with plans for activities for next year.

A highlight of the meeting will be the presentation of Life Membership awards to Dr. W.J.P. MacMillan, Col. G.E. Full and Dr. J.A. MacPhee in recognition of their long standing service in the fight against tuberculosis on the Prince Edward Island. The awards will be presented by Dr. Wherrett.

## Rotary Work With Crippled Children Reviewed Yesterday

"We cannot develop special services while burdened with hospitalization and education because of inadequate legislation," Keith B. A. Ph.D., National Executive Director Canadian Council for Crippled Children and Adults said in an address before the Rotary Club at their regular weekly luncheon meeting at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

Mr. Armstrong said that a million and a quarter children had been raised last year under the Easter Seal Campaign and thanked Rotary for the local effort made in this connection. The organization works in co-operation with established public health, welfare and educational departments of the provincial governments.

"On the basis of contributions received from the people of Ontario last year, the all-over Canadian contribution annually within the next five years might well be two-and-a-quarter millions."

**FOLLOW-UP**

"Our proper job as a voluntary agency is making good citizens," he said. He stressed the need of an adequate follow-up. "Many children receiving the best medical treatment lapse into a completely negative condition because parents are not familiar with the need to follow-up," Mr. Armstrong said.

Several cases were cited where the lack of education added to the problem of establishing a person after physical handicaps had been overcome by surgery and treatment. "Industry and commerce can absorb many handicapped persons but it is important that we find the right spot for the right people where adjustment may be complete and the person involved be happy and content in the work taken on," he said.

"While crippled children is basically a medical problem, it also involves everyone in the community; public health nurses, social workers and all interested citizens. There must be coordination of financial, personnel and facilities requirements to provide adequate provincial service, until there is a National movement to look after the situation, possibly when a National Health plan becomes effective," Mr. Armstrong concluded.

In introducing the speaker, Dr. Tudor Genchess as chairman referred to the career of Mrs. Armstrong, who was born in Japan and came to Canada at the age of seventeen. He is a graduate of the University of Toronto and has a Ph. D. from the University of New York where he specialized in Vocational Rehabilitation and is the only Ph. D. in this field in Canada.
