DE WET TRICKED.

Corporal Acton, 54th company Imperial Yeomanry, in a letter to a Newcastle, county Down, resident, says he was twice captured by the Boers, and each time managed to escape. The Yeoman, says Corporal Acton, were actually enjoying a pipe in Lindley when the shout was raised "The Boers are upon us!"

A trooper took him up beside him, but the horse could not carry both so he hid till morning. Coming upon two of Chesham's scouts reverly wounded he rendered first aid, and was making them some beet-tea from a piece of raw meat the Boers had given him, when he was again collared. He said he was a doctor, and indignantly demanded to see an officer asked him the meaning of his corporal's stripes and the absence of a Red Cross badge.

De Wet was not yet satisfied, however and demanded his papers.
