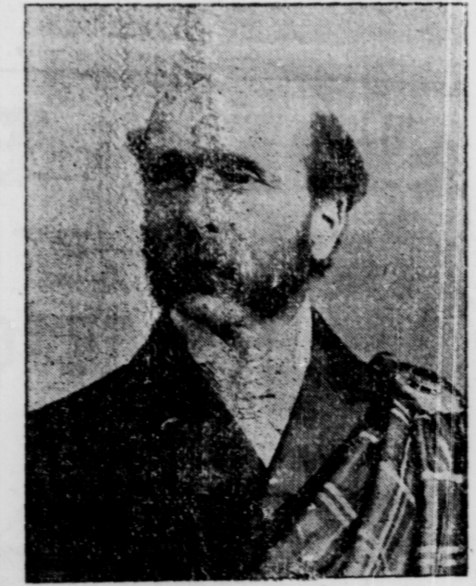

THE SCOTTISH GATHERING.

The greatest interest was taken in the various items on the programme of games by the large number of people present. The bicycle races, however, seemed to have the most admirers, and the two events under this heading were well contested. There was no loafing, and at the finish the winners had very little to boast about. Towards the finish of the five mile race, nearing the wire, Reggie Stewart and Harry Grady collided, and both were thrown from their wheels. Stewart's wheel was badly broken and he had to abandon the race. Grady pluckily resumed the race as soon as he could gather himself together, and putting on a magnificent spurt was soon up with the bunch, who had gained about a quarter of a lap by the accident. But the pace he struck was killing and he could not keep it up to the finish, and failed to secure a prize.

The half mile foot race was close, a good clip being maintained throughout. The pace was too warm for Flood, however, and he dropped out shortly after passing the last turn. At this point Lou McMillan overtook Dan McKinnon, who had been leading, and from that home the race was close between them, McMillan having only about a yard to spare at the finish. McMillan clipped a second off the provincial record for this distance.

The other races were also well contested and there were some close finishes. James McEachern participated in the pole vaulting competition and showed that, although he has not done anything in that line for years, he was able to make it interesting for his competitors.
