Gaelic College Summer School

St. Ann's, Cape Breton, now becoming known in Canada and the United States as "Little Scotland" will again be a Bee-hive of Celtic Culture Activity this summer from July 8th to August 15th, when the 19th Annual Session of the Gaelic College Summer School will get into operation bringing together over one hundred Tartan Clad students - lads and lassies representative of every province in Eastern Canada and the Eastern United States, and from Scotland, top instructors, Seumas MacNeill, the College of Piping, Glasgow, and James L. MacKenzie, Scottish and James's Champion Highland Dancer, Aberdeen.

The Summer School will operate with 53 classes daily, including Gaelic language, Gaelic Singing, Practice, Chanter, Bagpipe Music and Drumming, Clan Lore, Highland and Country Folk Dancing, and Pipe Band Training. The teaching staff will consist of four Directors and 16 instructors, Rev. A.W.R. MacKenzie will be School Director and Rev. A.D. MacDonald, Sydney, Director of Gaelic.

The long established centre covers a 52-acre site here — about 15 miles from Pittsburgh — and has 44 buildings. It employs 1,300 persons.

VANCOUVER (CP)—After five days of debate ranging over Canada's social and cultural life, 250 delegates to the annual meeting of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire today return to report to their home chapters across Canada.

Says Each Bomb Test Will Kill 50,000 Persons

NEW WESTMINSTER, B.C. (CP)—Dr. Brock Chisholm of Victoria, former head of the World Health Organization, says 50,000 persons throughout the world will die as a result of every nuclear bomb test.
Dr. Chisholm said Thursday in an interview the effects of radiation from the bomb tests are not immediate. He said they usually take the form of leukemia (cancer of the blood).
He was in hearty agreement with those in all nations who are working to have the bomb tests halted. However, he did not believe a nuclear war will come.
