

### Fresh Water Hit At 310 Ft. Depth

**SUMMERSIDE**—Drilling to a depth of 310 feet was required at the site of the new Island Packers Co. Ltd. fish processing plant on Queen's wharf here before fresh water was found. It is not yet known, however, if the well can supply enough pressure for the required 10-inch well. Special equipment will be moved to the \$200,000 construction site this afternoon to determine whether or not it will be necessary to go any deeper. The well, being bored by Douglas Bros and Jones of Charlottetown is less than 30 yards from the harbour and approximately 25 yards from a 45-foot well at the present fish processing plant.

### Veteran Nurse Dies In Manitoba

**WINNIPEG (CP)**—Helen Louise Randal, former registrar of nurses for British Columbia, died here Thursday. She was 91. A native of Compton, Que., Miss Randal was educated at Compton Ladies' College and after two years' teaching in Quebec and New York State, she entered Royal Victoria Hospital School of Nursing in Montreal where she graduated in 1903.

After two years' nursing in Montreal, she became superintendent of nurses at City Hospital, Rutland, Vt. She served later in the same position at St. Luke's Hospital, San Francisco, and Vancouver General Hospital.

One of a small group of B.C. nurses who pressed for an act to register nurses, she was appointed registrar when the act was passed in 1918. She held the position until her retirement in 1941.

In addition, she was the editor and business manager of the monthly magazine Canadian Nurse from 1916 to 1924.

### Grain Ship's Crew Puzzled

**CHURCHILL, Man. (CP)**—The crew of a sunken Yugoslav grain carrier prepared to head home, leaving behind a mystery of what sent their ship to the bottom of Hudson Strait.

Interviews with English-speaking members of the crew of 34 shed no light on why the 7,000-ton Kasteia began taking water last Saturday morning and sank almost 124 hours later. The entire crew was taken aboard the Canadian government icebreaker N. B. McLean. The icebreaker arrived Tuesday night at this Hudson Bay grain-shipping port 610 miles north of Winnipeg.

Ice in the bay's approaches had plagued shipping for a time when the navigation season opened here late in July.

But the Kasteia's skipper, Capt. Bruno Mazer of Rievica, Yugoslavia, said ice did not damage his Second World War Liberty ship which left here last week carrying 10,000 tons of Prairie wheat for the United Kingdom.

When the leak was noticed, he said, there was ice in the vicinity but the cakes were small and none was close to the ship. At no time was any bump felt.
