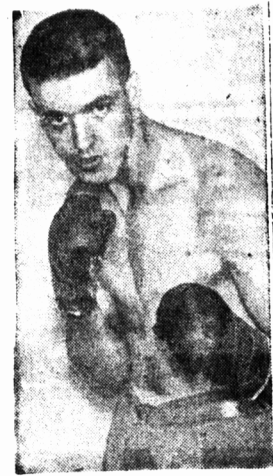

"Duck" Trainor Returns To Ring At Glace Bay May 21



Don "Duck" Trainor will be getting back in ring action on May 21st when he travels to Glace Bay to match gloves with Gord MacDougall of Cape Breton. Don is presently getting in shape for the bout at the naval barracks gym and will be as sharp as a 19 dollar tack when he sets out for Glace Bay to appear on the holiday card.

"I've never fought this lad before," said Don last night, "so I don't really know what to expect. But one thing is certain and that is that I'll be in good shape for the bout. I've been training here regularly every day for quite a while now."

Don's last appearance before Charlottetown fans was a brief but exciting one. Appearing as a semi-finalist on Ivan Doherty's Centennial card on July 12th, Duck disposed of Billy Crawford of New York in convincing fashion, knocking him down three times before belting him away for keeps in the first two minutes of the first round. Don has never

been noted as a slugger but it would take a lot of persuasive talking to convince Crawford of that on that cool July night.

Don hasn't set foot into a ring since last October when he lost a fight to Jerry Fraser but some box fans will believe he is still in the measure of MacDougall, provided he is in good shape for the bout. The Charlottetown boy will be, so the scrap has all the makings of a good one.

Dipping into the mailbag we find a note from Rick Fraser, sports editor of the New Glasgow News. Rick tells us that the New Glasgow road races which were a big drawing card some years ago are being revived this spring. Three 1 mile races are scheduled. Lemon Handles New York

Landy Leads Talented Cast In Race Meet

FRESNO, Calif. (AP)—Miracle miler John Landy and two other world record holders will lead a talented cast of 1,450 track and field athletes into the 30th west coast relay here Saturday.

Ratcliffe Stadium has been sold out for the big day-night carnival that will bring together nearly every prominent track man in California. Records are jeopardized in several events.

Landy, sensational Australian who has run the mile in 3:58, is billed as the headliner.

The Melbourne schoolteacher arrived his first workout on the hard-baked Ratcliffe track, regarded as one of the world's best. The clay running surface is in superb condition for the meet.

BAILEY NOT RUNNING

Landy is confident of victory and has predicted he may approach his record.

Chief opposition will come from Ireland's Ron Delaney, who finished third behind Jim Bailey and Landy in a historic race at Los Angeles last week.

Bailey, University of Oregon student, has passed up the relays for the Pacific coast conference northern division meet the same day.

Bob Lemon, who failed to complete a game in six starts against New York last year, handcuffed the Yankees with eight hits Thursday as Cleveland Indians captured the rubber of a three-game American League series 7-2.

In Boston, home runs by George Kell and Minnie Minoso and outstanding relief hurling by Bob Keegan snapped Chicago's five-game losing streak as the White Sox edged Boston 2-1.

Detroit at Washington was rained out, as were both scheduled games in the National circuit, Brooklyn at Chicago and St. Louis at Milwaukee.

MANTLE SPOILS SHUTOUT

Lemon would have had a shutout were it not for Mickey Mantle's 11th homer of the campaign in the sixth inning and Yogi Berra's 10th in the last inning.

The victory boosted the Indians past Boston into second place, two games behind the Yankees.

The Indians made the most of their triple hit that included a 450-foot triple by Al Rosen and doubles by Chico Carrasquel and Vic Wertz.

Mickey McDermott was the starter and loser for the Yankees.

KEEGAN TAKES OVER

Right-hander Keegan took over from Connie Johnson with one out and the bases loaded in the first. Jim Piersall grounded his first pitch into a double play.

Chick Zamick Captures 4th Scoring Title

LONDON (CP)—Victor (Chick) Zamick, 29-year-old sharpshooter from Winnipeg, has captured his fourth straight British hockey scoring title.

Official statistics released Thursday by the British Ice Hockey Association show that the diminutive playing coach of Nottingham Panthers scored 62 goals and 70 assists in 59 games for 132 points. The runner-up was Wembley Lions' star, Kenny Booth, formerly of Kelowna, B. C., with 128 points.

The five-foot, four-inch Zamick, one of the smallest players in British hockey, is also one of the most prolific scorers the game has ever known. In the nine years since he joined Panthers at the start of the 1947-48 season he has amassed a whopping 1,199-point total made up of 656 goals and 543 assists.

Besides winning the scoring championship again this season, Zamick piloted Panthers to the league title. Panthers finished first in the Autumn Cup series, which covers the first half of the season, and just edged out Wembley Lions for the league cup in the second half. Paisley Pirates, Brighton Tigers and Haringey Raiders followed in that order.

WHITE SULPHUR SPRINGS, W. Va. (AP) - The old pro, Sam Snead "made" only one putt Thursday on the last hole and young Mike Fetick missed one there by an inch to be the difference between them in the first round of the White Sulphur Springs open golf tourney.

Snead's 15-foot putt on the 18th gave him a birdie and a five-under par score of 65. Fetick's 12-foot try hung on the tip of the cup and he had to be satisfied with second choice, a par and score of 66.

Jack Isaacs, from Langley Field, Va., held third place with 67 among the 42 pros shooting for \$10,000 in prizes during the four-day tournament.
