

Two Warships Damaged In Search For Aircraft

HALIFAX (CP) — Two damaged warships returned to harbor here Tuesday after they crashed together while searching through the night for a trace of a missing Avenger aircraft.

While five other warships and 16 aircraft continued to fan out over the Atlantic, about 50 miles southeast of here, the 2,300-ton frigate Launceston and the 1,300-ton escort Portage churned slowly in to port under a tug escort.

The Portage, with her bow smashed in and a forepeak open to the sea, moved along under her own power but the Launceston got help from two tugs. The frigate's starboard side had a four-foot-square hole at the waterline.

The only injury was a bruised hand suffered by an unidentified sailor. Cause of the collision is not known. The sea was said to be calm and there was no fog when the ships smashed.

The two damaged ships will be surveyed within the next couple of days before an inquiry open into the accident. The Launceston is commanded by Lt. Cdr. J. C. Carter of Montreal and the Portage by Lt. Cdr. K. R. Crombie of West Vancouver and Halifax.

PLANE STILL MISSING

Meanwhile, no trace has been found of the single-engine naval Avenger which has been missing since its pilot, Sub. Lt. Morris K. Marinsky of E. Theibert, Man., asked for landing instructions from the Shearwater tower Monday afternoon. He was believed to have been about 50 miles southeast of here at that time.

The aircraft, which usually carries four men, is equipped with a rubber dinghy and emergency rations.

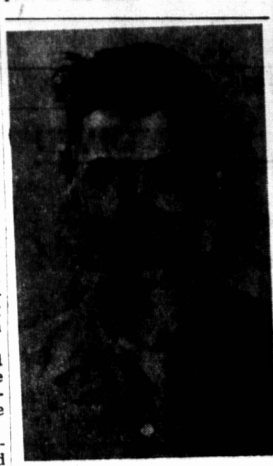
Up to 25 aircraft took part in the search Tuesday and five naval vessels conducted a surface hunt for a trace of the missing plane.

A search and rescue spokesman said all reports of fires, explosions and reports of low flying planes were checked. Planes from Shearwater made 50 sorties.

Six RCAF and RCN aircraft will search throughout the night for the missing Avenger and its lone occupant, a search and rescue spokesman said here Tuesday.

He said two RCAF Neptune aircraft from Greenwood, N.S., and four planes from the navy's nearby Shearwater base will take part. In addition, four navy planes will

take off from Shearwater every three hours to relieve those taking part in the hunt.

Bishop Waterman Addresses St. Paul's Laymen's Ass'n

The Right Rev. R.H. Waterman, B.A., D.D., Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia was guest speaker at the monthly supper meeting of the Laymen's Association of St. Paul's Anglican church, held in the parish hall last night. More than two hundred laymen were in attendance, including guests from St. Peter's Cathedral Association and St. John's Church, Milton.

The meeting, which was presided over by T.D. DeBlas, president of St. Paul's Association, was opened with grace by Rev. Canon G.E. Mofatt, Rector of St. Peter's.

In the course of his address Bishop Waterman said that laymen take a very real place in the life of the religious group to which they belong. The Christian Church makes a contribution to the community based on high ideas and principles. He urged that Anglican churchmen should be well informed regarding the long history and heritage of their church which

was founded by St. Augustine in 597, he being the first Archbishop of Canterbury.

His Lordship referred to the 341 dioceses and 40 million members of the Anglican Communion through out the world and the 311 churches in 121 parishes in the Diocese of Nova Scotia, which includes P.E. Island.

Coroner's Act Provides For Appointment of Chief Coroner

Provision for the appointment of a chief coroner for the Province is contained in the Coroner's Act now being considered in the Legislature. The Bill introduced by Attorney General Matheson was still in committee when the House adjourned yesterday at 6:00 p.m.

The chief coroner will act in an ex-officio or advisory capacity to the attorney general and preside over such duties with respect to the office of coroner throughout the Province. A county coroner may be named chief coroner in which case he may act in any county of the Province.

The Attorney General said that while some of the coroners have been sending in prompt reports of inquests, there were others who were as tardy as three weeks in submitting reports. Mr. Matheson said quite often the reports contained considerable medical terminology which made it difficult to interpret.

The chief coroner, in lieu of fees, will be paid out of the consolidated revenue fund. The salary will be fixed by the Lieutenant Governor in Council.

The act provides that one or more coroners may be appointed in each of the counties. The attorney general may in writing direct the coroner of one county to act in any other county of the Province.

Dr. Bonnell said there would be more than twice the number of deaths to report when the length of the inquest was extended to 48 hours. The Minister of Health then moved two amendments to the Act: 1. That the time be changed from 48 to 24 hours and that the coroner's fee for investigating cases where no inquest is held, be changed from \$10 to \$5. If the coroner has to travel to make his investigation he may charge mileage at the rate of ten cents per mile both ways.

The Attorney General said the 48-hour period had been recommended to him by the president of the Medical Association. He said that he himself was in no position to say whether it was right or wrong but since strong exception had been taken by the two doctor members of the House he would agree to the amendment.

In regard to the second amendment, Mr. Matheson said he could hardly picture a medical man spending an hour or two of his time for \$5.00. He felt the Department would not get the service it should by cutting the fee.

When put to a vote, Dr. Bonnell's both amendments carried.

"Downhome Jean", a two-year-old cow ranked by Hooper Bros. Rustico ranked 20th out of 406 for production in the younger cows. In the 305-day division she produced 12,093 pounds of milk containing 492 pounds of fat testing 4.09 per cent.

In the three-year-old class, two-time milking, 365 day division "Crown Point Model", owned by A. Gallant, North Rustico, produced 15,925 pounds of milk, 594 pounds of fat testing 3.73 per cent. She was ninth in a class of 380.

EMBALMING THE BODY

The act provides that no undertaker shall embalm a body or apply chemicals either to the interior or exterior of same until given a death certificate, either by the attending physician or the coroner.

Dr. Dewar said doctors were often put on the spot by undertakers who, after they had a remains completely prepared for burial, asked the physician for a death certificate. Dr. Dewar said, a doctor could not accurately state the cause of death if he were not attending the person previous to death. Rather than cause alarm or undue upset to the relatives the doctor, after reasonable assurance that no unusual circumstances surrounded the death, would issue a death certificate.

An undertaker failing to comply with the above regulations may be subject to a fine of \$50 or 30 days in jail.

Ferry May Cut Distance To The Annapolis Valley

HALIFAX (CP) — The federal government will survey possible terminal sites for a new auto ferry service across the mouth of Minas Basin at the head of the Bay of Fundy, Allison T. Smith (L. — Cumberland West) told the legislature Monday night.

He said the survey will begin late in April. He hoped the federal public works department also would build the piers.

Ferry service between Parrsboro on the north shore of the basin and Kingsport in the Annapolis Valley started in 1900. Later the Dominion Atlantic Railway operated an automobile and passenger ferry on a 22-mile route between Parrsboro, Kingsport and Wolfville, N.S., but discontinued during the Second World War.

The proposed new ferry would run between a point near Cape Blomidon on the south shore and Partridge Island near Parrsboro. It would provide a short five-mile water route between the Annapolis Valley and Northern Nova Scotia, about 150 miles apart by road.
