Blame Mechanical Trouble For Plane Crash

TOKYO. (Reuters)—Mechanical trouble led to the crash of an American Globemaster plane near here June 18 in which 129 persons lost their lives, the worst accident in flying history, the United States Air Force announced Sunday.
The announcement said the huge four-engined C-124 transport grounded while the crash was being investigated, were put back into operation today.

Quebec Forest Fires Now Under Control

QUEBEC (CP)—Forest fires in northern and western Quebec have destroyed approximately 150 square miles of timber since May 1.
A large part of the damage was caused this week by a series of fires now all under control. It took 3,000 experienced fire fighters and woodsmen and a heavy down-pour to turn the tide.

In the second dash, Shining Hour was the pace-setter all the way, but, forced to a spirited stretch drive by Hedgewood Chief, came under the wire first with a new record of 2:10 1-5 for the half horse.

Liberal Charges Quebec Has "Regime Of Terror,"

ST. RAYMOND, Que. (CP)—Georges Lapalme, Quebec Liberal party leader, said Saturday the Union Nationale party has set up a "regime of terror" in Quebec.
Speaking at a political rally in this Portneuf county mill town in support of Des Roes, Liberal candidate in Thursday's provincial election, Mr. Lapalme said national societies and Chambers of Commerce in Quebec province are "afraid" to express their opinions.
The party in power has a "stanglehold on everybody," Mr. Lapalme, candidate in Montreal Outremont in another election Thursday, said two groups have launched an attack against the Union Nationale, labor and the Liberal party.

Omitted from the broadcast was the usual acid charge that the UN and the U. S. especially "connived" with Rhee in the mid-June mass escape of 27,000 anti-Red North Korean war prisoners.
At Pusan, South Korea's defence minister, Sohn Won Il, said the RoK government issued strict orders Friday prohibiting escaped North Koreans from enlisting in the RoK army.
Previously the South Korean government has taken the position that any Korean could enter the army and fight for the country.
Sohn flatly denied a report from a reliable military source that more than 1,600 of the former PoWs had voluntarily entered the army since July 1. He said that if any of them had been inducted in the draft process they would be discharged.
