The next speaker, the Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Agriculture, outlined some of the difficulties faced by Island farmers.

(Continued from page 1) have more time to think and their voice is indispensable in the councils of the nation. That takes education. And rural children should have maximum opportunities to make their effective contribution later on.

"What facilities have they now? In some areas good and in some bad. Rural schools need not to be one bit less efficient than city ones. Size and numbers mean very little and the huge city high schools can be a poor school just as well as a smaller place. What counts is the quality of the teacher and the effort of the pupils and no buildings or facilities will be of the slightest use if the personal factors are lacking.

They can go much quicker than the city youngsters who are limited to the confines of one grade. But the teacher must be good. With a poor teacher the country school is very weak. Its real disadvantage is the fact that the teacher has too many subjects to cover especially if she handles grades 9 and 10. Again it depends on the teacher; I have taught some young people who have come out of one room country schools and have been amazed at how much they knew about all subjects. The deciding factor in such cases is that the competent teacher doesn't attempt to do everything, which practice is fatal, but encourages the pupil to get as much knowledge as possible by himself.

I therefore say to you that you should as school trustees seek the best possible teacher you can find. There is no real shortage of teachers; all that's wrong is that trustees will take almost anybody and provide salaries and working conditions which are much poorer than those of other occupations. The result is that we have a twenty per cent turnover of teachers in this Province every year which is a disgrace considering a national average of eight per cent. You will get only unskilled teachers if all you offer is unskilled labourer's wages, and remember that your children will not get good instruction unless the teacher knows what she's talking about. If you say you can't find the money then you can't expect the education. The government can't find it for you because it only has your taxes.

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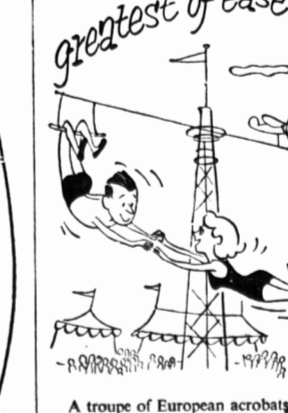
