NFL uncovered plotting scandal in Ruzor Probe

By MIRRA YRISKI NEW YORK (AP)—The prospect of a National Football League, disturbed by whispered rumors of a scandal, said Tuesday that investigations in Chicago and Detroit have uncovered "nothing more than questionable associations."

There have been no actual charges of wrong doing by any player. The players, however, have expressed anger and bitterness over aspersions cast on them.
