

# Youth's Condition Reported Only Fair

**TORONTO** — The condition of Keith Willard Coffin, 21-year-old Charlottetown guitar player, was reported to be fair, by medical authorities Thursday following amputation of his left leg.

The Charlottetown boy is in the intensive care unit, of the Queen'sway General Hospital here, and is therefore denied visitors, except for his parents, who flew here from Charlottetown and are staying at the home of friends.

Young Coffin, a member of The Outcasts rock 'n' roll group, was hurt when their light traveling van hit a guardrail on the Queen Elizabeth Throughway on Sunday. One of the musical comb was killed, along with a workman erecting the guardrail, the vehicle struck.

Barry Harrison of Charlottetown, another guitarist in the group, escaped injury and was reported to have returned home.

Dr. Morton Shulman, chief coroner, has called for an inquest into the deaths of the two victims.
