UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (CP) -Assembly president L. B. Pearson said Saturday night the Indian truce resolution rejected by the Communists in December is still the starting point for any further Korean move that might come before the United Nations session reopening Tuesday.

Canada's External Affairs Minister referred in a recorded UN program broadcast by CBS to the Korean resolution adopted overwhelmingly by the UN assembly over Russian objections.

"It might well be that the assembly will decide that they have taken a very important step last autumn in the Indian resolution and that, insofar as Korea is concerned, no further step at this time is required," Pearson said.

"But I don't know about that because I don't know what the views of the various delegations are. I know they will all be anxious in some way to bring the fighting to an end."

Some Western delegates have expressed belief it is up to Russia to come forward with any new proposal to solve the war-prisoners issue which has deadlocked the truce talks at Panmunjom.

Blockade Outlook
Meanwhile, the U. S. delegation was reported to have given assurances to other countries with fighting forces in Korea that they feared that the U. S. might demand UN action on a naval blockade or a tightening of the existing embargo on Communist China.

It was believed here that if a blockade were undertaken by the U.S. it would be an unilateral action and would not be laid before the UN.

Pearson said in talk of a possible blockade that the fact is sometimes forgotten that UN members, still are bound by an embargo they voted in 1950 "to prevent arms and strategic materials from reaching those whom we have determined to be the aggressors."

Pearson defended the UN secretariat against charges it was "honeycombed" with subversive activities, charges that will be explored by the assembly in a debate on personnel expected to be a hot assembly issue.

The death occurred at his home in Carleton on Sunday, February 22nd of Thomas B. Gillespie in his 73rd year.
Mr. Gillespie was born in Carleton, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Gillespie, and spent his life in the old homestead where he was a prosperous farmer and one of the most highly esteemed residents in the community. He was an elder in the Church of Scotland at Cape Traverse.
Besides his wife, the former Mammie LeFurgey, he is survived by one daughter, Doris, Mrs. Hazen MacWilliams of Cape Traverse, and two sons, Gordon of Montreal and Hazen at home; also three sisters, Mrs. D.M. Campbell of Saskatoon, Mrs. Ernest MacLaren of Toronto and Mrs. Rae Gillespie of Charlottetown, and one brother, W. E. Gillespie of Charlottetown.
Funeral service will be held at his late residence on Wednesday at 2 P.M. and burial will be in the Church of Scotland Cemetery at Cape Traverse.

Dunk River Dairying Co. Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of Dunk River Dairying Company was held in Central Bedouque on Feb. 10th and was largely attended. The President, W.J. Reid, presided and opened the meeting with a brief review of the year's business. The Secretary - Manager, Major J.S. Wright, gave the financial statement of the standing of the company and a summary of the year's business showing total sales of butter, buttermilk, etc. \$27,195.35 handling over 288,200 lbs. of butter-fat paying on an average for the year \$8.96 to the producer. The financial position of this company is exceptionally good, having recently built a new feed warehouse and covered walls and roof of the entire original building with asphalt, installed a new pasteurizer, new churn, new scale, new boiler, new butter printer, and cold storage plant. The capital and surplus of the company over and above the liabilities amounted to \$37,836.95.
Trophies were presented to the three highest patrons, Elmer Reeves sending cream to the value of \$3,569.49, Scott Cairns cream value \$2,829.90, and Frank Jardine, cream value \$2,671.08.
Mr. Ken Calbeck was present representing the Purina Feed Co. and made two presentations on behalf of his company for the two highest R.O.P. cows in the company: one was presented to Allison Profit, for a Holstein cow four years old that produced 19,236 pounds of milk containing fat to the amount of 856 lbs. in 365 days, and a second to Edwin Lord for having a Jersey cow five years old producing 15,572 pounds of milk with 809 lbs. of fat in 348 days.
