or missed beat. Perhaps without further examination the doctor thought the pain in your chest was due to heart disease or found some slight abnormality in your electrocardiogram. Dr. Alvarez states that what he should have told you was that the changes are due to your age, your stout build, your increase in blood pressure or the medicine you are taking. If the specialist gives you a letter to your doctor, you may immediately suspect that something is wrong with your heart whereas the letter may mention only some harmless condition present and is mentioned only for a matter of record. "Today a high percentage of patients who are needlessly worried about heart disease were frightened originally by a pessimistic reading or interpretation of an electrocardiogram." Many have the idea that the electrocardiogram records are useless if not read or interpreted correctly. As stated before, the real and easiest test of the heart's ability is to measure how far the patient can walk at a certain rate of speed without getting out of breath.
