Construction President To Meet With Premier

The president of the Canadian Construction Association, Arm and Trotter of Quebec City, is visiting Prince Edward Island and will meet with Premier Alex Campbell and Ministers of Public Works, Highway, and Labour today before leaving for Halifax to continue his tour of the Atlantic Provinces. Mr. Trotter has already visited Fredericton and Moncton, New Brunswick, where he met informally with cabinet members of the government and with some of the construction organizations affiliated to the CCA.

During his courtesy call on Mr. Campbell, Mr. Trotter hopes to discuss labor relations and training, standard practices in bidding as well as what is going on in the other provinces compared to P.E.I. He will be accompanied during the meeting by national Vice-President, A. William Purdy, Calgary, and provincial Vice-President, David E. Morrison, Summerside, as well as representatives of the P.E.I. Road Builders Association and the Builders Exchange.

Premier Campbell Meets Delegation

A meeting between Premier Alex Campbell and a delegation of cabinet ministers with the mayor and town councillors of Summerside in Summerside yesterday morning was described by the premier as being "profitable".

The premier said that it was "profitable from the standpoint of clearing the way toward the initial decision as to who shall accept the primary responsibility in scheduling an early construction of low rental housing in the Summerside area."

He said that it was "very obvious that all parties concerned are determined to press on with the project and to this end a joint meeting will be held between the town and official representatives of the P.E.I. Housing Authority, clergy, Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation."

SET FOR WEDNESDAY

The meeting which will also include the cabinet has been tentatively scheduled for next Wednesday.

The premier stated that because "there are alternative programs for low rental housing it has yet to be decided which type of accommodation will be provided for the Summerside area."

The premier said that it was "profitable from the standpoint of clearing the way toward the initial decision as to

who shall accept the primary responsibility in scheduling an early construction of low rental housing in the Summerside area."

He added that he expected an early start on the project, possibly as a winter works program.

The meeting was called to discuss the low rental housing in Summerside with Mayor George Key and the town council. Also present were Rev. Robert Matthews, representing the clergy, who brought the issue back before council at their latest meeting, town clerk-treasurer John Cameron and town manager J. A. Brophy.

MAYOR COMMENTS

Mayor Key made the following comment on the meeting:

"It was a very productive meeting. I feel the government, as a result of this meeting, is more aware of the problem of low-rental housing in Summerside, and has indicated an early start on the project of housing, and the chairman of housing, Hon. Gordon Bennett, is arranging a further meeting with representatives of the provincial Housing Commission and CMHC of Summerside."

The meeting was an hour behind schedule. The cabinet made a tour of the Western end of the county yesterday.

Constable MacIntyre Apprehends Driver

Constable Wayne MacIntyre of city police force apprehended the driver of a vehicle which police say led them on a chase for approximately two and one-half hours at 11:30 Tuesday, in a field near Souris.

Warren MacKenzie, Parkdale policeman, attempted to stop the vehicle for speeding in Parkdale and the city police took up the chase which went in North River Road, around Victoria Park and east on Kent street before leaving the city.

The chase ended with Constable MacIntyre tackling the driver of the pursued vehicle after he jumped from his car and attempted to evade the police.

Constable MacIntyre is reported to have lost the vehicle for a short time in Souris when he had to go through a field and the engine of the police car got wet and he had to wait a short time to dry the engine.

Constable MacIntyre then went to the Souris detachment of the RCMP who assisted him in searching for the vehicle and MacIntyre spotted it parked in a field.

The driver of the vehicle will be charged in court in the near future.

J. A. Laybolt Passes Away

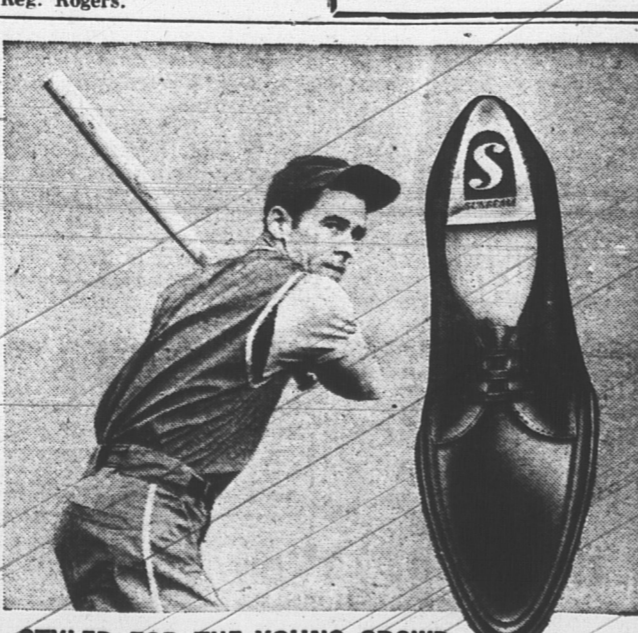

Island Veterans Schedule Meeting

Islanders who served in World War I in France in 1915 and who recently held a preparatory organization meeting to form an association, will meet Oct. 27 at a dinner at the Charlottetown Canadian Legion, Charlottetown.

Bruce Wonnacott, acting secretary, has been in touch with more than 50 men qualified to join. They were the first Islanders to serve in a field of operation in World War I. They represent such units as the 13th and 14th Battalions of Montreal, the 1st Field Ambulance, the 24th Battalion of Battalion of Montreal, the 26th New Brunswick Regiment, the 24th Field Battery of Fredericton, N.B., the 2nd Heavy Battery of Sherbrooke, Que., the Royal Canadian Navy and the original British Army which arrived in France in 1914.

Veterans from all over the Island are expected to attend the muster. Acting secretary Wonnacott does not know yet how many but estimates between 30 and 40. At the dinner it is hoped to arrange a re-union of the 1914-5 veterans for centennial year and perhaps as part of the celebrations. The dinner will be the last get-together until 1967.
