

BYC And C. Packers Split Softball Doubleheader

Canada Packers moved into a two-one lead in their final for the Ontario Softball championship as the two clubs split a doubleheader at Memorial Field last night.

The B. Y. C. scored five runs in the last of the seventh to win the opening game 13-12 but the Packers rebounded to win the second contest 15-8.

Joe Thistle was the winning pitcher for the B. Y. C. in the opening game and Henry Hartinger the loser. Thistle was touched for 13 hits and Hartinger for 20.

The B. Y. C. trailed 12-8 going into the last inning. Alf Coody led off with a walk and was forced at second as Thistle reached base on a fielders choice.

Charlie Weatherbie and John Walsh hit back to back singles followed by consecutive doubles off the bats of Gerard Burge and Father Clarence Roche. Ray MacCloskey doubled into left field to send Father Roche across the plate with the winning run.

The Packers had scored five runs in the sixth inning on a double by Hartinger, triples by George Kelly and George Bradley and singles by Bill Acorn and Mike Connolly.

Father Roche led all batters with three doubles and a single while John Walsh had four singles and Charlie Weatherbie three singles.

George Bradley and Mike Connolly led the Packers with Bradley getting a triple and two singles and Connolly socking out a double and two singles.

SECOND GAME

Billy Wright was the winning pitcher for the Packers in the second game and Dunstan MacDonald the loser. MacDonald was relieved by Father Roche in the third. Wright was touched for 15 hits and

the B. Y. C. hurled for 14.

The B. Y. C. went into a 2-0 lead in the first inning but the Packers scored six runs in the second frame and seven more in the third.

In the second inning Billy Acorn and Bob Hurry hit back to back doubles and Pete MacIntyre a single. Reg Hughes drew a walk. Len Arsenault got a single and Mike Connolly cleared the bases with a triple.

A double, three singles and four walks accounted for the Packers runs in the third inning.

Len Arsenault led the Packers attack with a double, triple and single. George Bradley hit a home run in the sixth but was called out at third when he failed to touch the base. Mike Connolly hit a double and triple while Bob Hurry and Pete MacIntyre both had two hits.

Donnie MacLean, the big three-game winner in this series for the Abbies, will be on the mound for the Charlottetown squad while Paul Schurman will start for Holman's. Schurman also has won three games for his team.

The Abbies have obtained juniors Kip Ready and Don MacLeod from the junior club as replacements for Phil Murphy and Eddy Lund who have left the Province to resume studies at Medical School.

Also in the Abbies lineup will be Paul Jay who has returned to the Province from Montreal.

MacLeod is expected to start in centerfield and Ready at first base. Otherwise the Abbies lineup will be the same as that which was used in past games.

Playing coach Jack Ready put his players through a workout yesterday evening in preparation for the final game which will be the most important of the season. The series has produced a little

bit of everything in the way of baseball. There have been good pitching performances and bad ones, good hitting and defensive plays.

The Abbies at one point led two games to none but Summerside bounced back to win two games in one afternoon. The Abbies then went ahead a game but Summerside came back at home last Friday to knot the count.

IN THIS CORNER

Coach Earl Nicholson along with city athletes Don MacLeod and John Kane and Summerside athletes Mel Campbell and Johnny Whelan arrived home from the Olympic Training Games program at Toronto yesterday morning. The boys underwent nine days of coaching and training, the last three days of which were spent at the interprovincial track meet.

Jack Kane won the athletic award for the Prince Edward Island athletes. He competed in both the 100 and 220 yard dashes. He reached the semifinals of the 100 and after two false starts in the 220 was penalized five yards and so finished out of the running. Time of the winning 100 yard dash was 9.6 and time of the 220 was 21.2.

The athletes attended lectures each morning and were out on the field for training in the afternoon. Among the personalities they met were Ken Gardiner of Jamaica, who holds the record for the British Empire Games hurdles and Bob Richards the noted pole vaulter from the United States.

The track and field meet at Memorial Field on Monday afternoon uncovered several promising youth athletes. Dave MacLeod's performance in the 100 yard dash was the highlight of the meet. Dave ran the 100 in ten seconds and that stamps him as the best dash man around since Walter LePace. MacLeod also showed himself quite versatile, having several other good placings.

Lorne MacGuigan stamped himself as a good high jumper as he cleared the bar at five feet, two inches. With more practice in the event MacGuigan should be able to better his mark by several inches. Kenny MacDonald of Kilburn won the running broad jump and Kenny is another boy who has plenty of potential in field events.

The meet was the best to be held here for several years and it showed that there is still quite an interest in this line of athletics. The Halifax Navy had a big team present and they edged out the Abbies for team honors. The Navy men sent plenty of runners and they cleaned up honors in everything except the 100 yard dash.

The meet was the first of a series which will be staged by the Physical Fitness Department within the next month. There will be meets for each of the city schools after which there will be a meet between the schools. This is all part of a plan to put track and field athletics back on the plane to which they belong.

Famous Football Coach Dies

PALO ALTO, Calif. (AP)—Glenn Scobey (Pop) Warner of football coaching fame died Tuesday. He was 83.

Ill for months with throat cancer, Warner became unconscious 12 hours before his death.

At his hospital bedside were his wife, the former Tibb Loraine Smith; a niece, and Mr. and Mrs. Ben Winkelman of Palo Alto. Winkelman, a longtime friend, was assistant coach when Warner coached his famed Stanford University teams from 1924 to 1933.

Warner's coaching career spanned parts of two centuries—from the 90s to the strike-borne years entering the Second World War.

As guard and captain of the 1893 Cornell team, he also served as an unpaid coach of the club. At that time he was 22 years old, a big, rugged youngster, who was born in Springville, N. Y., April 5, 1871, but reared on a ranch near Wichita Falls, Tex.

His modest beginning in Cornell athletics was the springboard that led him to the top of the coaching ranks.

Annual International Tuna Tournament Opens Today

WEDGEPONT, N. S. (CP)—Seven teams representing 11 countries will get down to business today as the 11th international tuna tournament opens on the waters off this tiny fishing village on the southern tip of Nova Scotia.

About 40 of the world's top anglers are here on teams representing Mexico, the defending champions, Argentina, Cuba, France, United States, Venezuela and the British Empire. The British Empire team has two members from Bermuda, one each from England and South Africa, and three from Canada.

The tuna have found a natural home on famed Soldier's rip, 12 miles off this port and also at the mouth of the nearby Tusket river. The prize at stake is the Sharp trophy, a shining silver bowl on a mahogany base.

TUNA MORE PLENTIFUL

In 1953 only four fish were caught during the three-day play that was delayed by a hurricane. Things look brighter this year. Even the fishermen, who usually pass over any questions as to how they will fare, were optimistic as they came in from final practice spins Tuesday.

This season 266 tuna have been caught, while only 129 were landed all last year.

Ten fish fell victim to the crack sportsmen Tuesday. British Empire team member, Don Henley of Toronto set the pace with a whopping 688-pounder after a battle that lasted an hour and 55 minutes.

It was Henley's biggest - ever catch and the second largest fish landed this season by tournament anglers. It was the seventh fish for Henley this week. He leads all anglers in catches during practice rounds.

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—After Davey Williams walked and Willie Mays was passed intentionally, Monte Irvin hit a two-run double in the 11th inning Tuesday night as the New York Giants whipped the Philadelphia Phillies 3-1 and hiked their National League lead over the idle Milwaukee Braves to 4½ games.

The game was a tightly-knit battle royal all the way with loser Curt Simmons pitching his heart out, allowing only seven scattered hits as he lost his 14th of the season against 12 wins.

The victory was claimed by Ruben Gomez, who went 10 1-3 in innings, to make his win-loss record read 13-9.

Mays and Irvin also figured in the Giants' first run, scored in the second while Gran Hamner hit his 12th homer of the year in the eighth to tie it up at 1-1.

The Phils threatened right down to the final gun, loading the bases in the bottom of the 11th as Willie Jones and Floyd Baker singled and Mel Clark beat out an infield hit. But reliever Hoyt Wilhelm forced Stan Lopata to foul out and ended the ball game.

The Washington Senators overcame a four run Philadelphia lead Tuesday to edge the Athletics, 5-4, as Frank Shea won his second game of the season. Ed Fitzgerald's eighth inning single drove in the winning run before one of Washington's smallest baseball crowds ever—460.
