

12th ANNUAL PROVINCIAL PLOWING MATCH AT DUNDAS

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Autumn Show Is Expected To Top All Previous Events

Old-fashioned plowing with horse drawn plows, modern tractor two and three sod plowing and a horse show will vie with each other for top interest when the annual Provincial Plowing Match is held at Dundas tomorrow and Thursday. In addition the huge throng expected to attend will see sports of all types, exhibitions of handicrafts and both potato and turnip showings.

There will be a full line of sporting events on the opening day, but they will be for senior competitors only. The junior sports will be held Thursday.

One of the top events, the single furrow open plowing match will be staged on Thursday, along with the gang plow, for competitors under 18 years of age; and the two and three sod tractor events for women or girls.

The horse classes include draft mare or gelding born in the years 1949, 1950 and 1951; draft mare with foal at foot; draft foal of 1952; draft stallion; draft mare or gelding over 1,400 pounds born before January 1, 1949, and the same class for those born then under 1,400 pounds; general purpose draft mare or gelding born before January 1, 1949, and the class born after that date.

The plowing teams of horses will have classes for teams over 2,600 pounds, 2,200 to 2,600 and under 2,000 pounds. There will also be a class for a draft team hitched to truck wagon.

Plowing events will be judged by Mr. W. W. Baird, formerly of Nappan, N.S., while the various horse class will be judged by Mr. W. J. Reid, Middleton, N.S.

It was announced yesterday that the Ayshire Field Day for Kings County, female showing only, will also form part of Wednesday's program.

Still another new attraction engaged to make an appearance on the Dundas program will be the Lads and Lassie Pipe and Drum Band, under the direction of Bandmaster W. B. Burke. This fine Highland organization in colorful regalia has a growing following, and has been well received wherever it has played this year. There will also be Highland dancing.

Refreshments for the large crowds expected will be efficiently taken care of by a staff of work-

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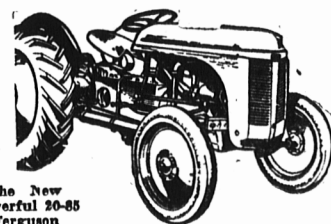
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
