Fisheries Minister Makes Announcement

Fisheries Minister, Leo Rossiter announced in the Legislature yesterday the construction of a \$150,000 receiving station and drying plant for Irish Moss is to be started immediately at Miminegash in Prince County.

He said the plant, to be built by Marine Colloids, Incorporated, is expected to be in operation in August.  
Mr. Rossiter said the operation will consist of a warehouse and drying building which will contain a large mechanical dryer that will have a capacity for 15,000,000 pounds of wet moss.  
"Encouragement will be given," said Mr. Rossiter, "to have fishermen rake moss which is of better quality than storm-tossed moss and will provide greater returns. The plant will also accept storm-tossed moss."

Premier Walter R. Shaw rose to pay tribute to Mr. Matheson's quarter-century of public service. "On behalf of the government and members of the Conservative Party," he said "I extend congratulations on your having reached 25 years in the service of the people of the province. Political life is sometimes cruel and does not provide much gratitude."  
"A politician is required to make very material sacrifices in the public service and this fact is not recognized by people generally."

Opposition Leader Alex Campbell said he "was happy to join with the premier" in congratulating Mr. Matheson. He said "there are very few men in political life who have served so long and with such untrifling devotion to the people of the province."  
Mr. Matheson said he appreciated the "kind words of the premier and the opposition leader." He said he had never sought a nomination for political office and that nominations had been thrust upon him. "In the May 16 election," he said, "I have an offer to run against the premier in his district and if I do, I'll take the House Speaker down to defeat with him."

Members turned their attentions to legislation yesterday and it appears now that the frequency of sittings will be increased with a sitting scheduled for Monday.

Maine State Legislature Representative James T. Dudley of Enfield, Maine said that construction will start this summer on improving a section of the route in the Cadyville area, from Lee to Lincoln. The Corridor Road is a proposed project which would connect the Maritime Provinces with Quebec by a direct route across Maine.  
Mr. Brennan said the road "will mean a tremendous sav-

ing in the transportation of goods from the Maritimes to Central Canada and the United States and back again." With the completion of the road the minimum distance from Charlottetown to Montreal and back again would be a minimum saving of 360 miles.  
Clyde Hitchborn of Maxfield, Maine, presided at the meeting which was held at the Rioux Industrial Estates. Representatives attended from Maine, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Quebec.
