

New Cure For Consumption.

ENCOURAGE EXPERIMENTS WITH THE FRENCH TREATMENT AT HARTFORD.

Several prominent physicians of Hartford Conn. have been investigating the new French treatment of consumption by the injection of sulphureted hydrogen gas. In fact, experiments were made by Dr. Johnson, of that city, somewhat earlier than those at the Philadelphia hospital. The experiments have been continued, principally at the free dispensary, by Drs. Johnson and Rott, the former having devised an apparatus for making and administering the gas from descriptions given of the French method. Several patients have been under treatment, and with encouraging results. The physicians above named said that, while they had every reason to be satisfied with the results, they had not feel like heralding the treatment of a sure cure. Their patients have been under treatment only two or three months, and before speaking positively as to the efficacy of the work, treatment should be continued much longer—perhaps a year. Dr. Steven A. Yorge, a practitioner, is so well satisfied with the results he has witnessed that he is preparing to introduce the treatment into his own practice. The strongest testimony received as to the value of the new system was given by A. J. Lowe, a printer, who has been under treatment five weeks. He was in an advanced stage of the disease when he began, but is now so far improved that he is able to resume work. His appetite has improved and night sweats have ceased. Lowe added that other unfortunates whom he knows personally are improving, and that one physician is taking the treatment himself and with beneficial results.
