Miscouche RHS Graduates Urged Seize Opportunities

Miscouche Regional High School graduated 21 students at commencement exercises Friday in the auditorium of the recently opened school. Presiding was chairman of the school board B.W. DesRoches.

The graduates were addressed by provincial education minister, Hon. L.G. Dewar who spoke to them on "the master word" without revealing the mystery word until near the end of his remarks.

Dr. Dewar told the graduates they were endeavouring to capture some of the great fields of knowledge that are available in the world today. The minister said that from the time of Christ until 1750 the field of knowledge doubled, it doubled again between 1750 and 1900, and once more it doubled in the past 10 years, he stated. "You have an obligation to do something with the opportunity before you."

Dr. Dewar told the 12 male and nine female graduates that 70 per cent of the jobs available today require some training or skill of some degree. He stated it was a sad state of affairs to realize "that we are only training about 20 per cent to take advantage of 70 per cent of the jobs available."

The education minister said to expect you when you go out into the world to be competitive, complete in sports, because it physically important to get fresh air deep down into your lungs. I am a great exponent of fresh air and sunshine as two of the greatest elements to which we can be exposed.

Dr. Dewar told the class to compete scholastically — "not because you want to be first because you want to do your best. Compete in community life. Seek an office and try to compete in the rest of life in a community," he advised.

"Compete professionally," he advised, "in doing these things, appreciate the things of beauty around you — nature, literature, the arts."

"You have youth, courage and ambition and there should be no doubt appreciate more as you gain knowledge," he stated. Dr. Dewar revealed the master word is "seize" and that without success can be gained.

The principal, Sister St. Mary Eugenia, during her remarks, related that the school had opened on May 10 and noted that since then enthusiasm and satisfaction has been quite evident in the work of the boys and girls. She stated that 188 pupils registered last September.

Emphasizing that this was the first graduating class from the school she said the success attained by the students had been quite satisfactory, but added that some students spend too much time on socials, sports, TV and they come to realize the things attained without much effort are quite often worth very little.

She stressed there should be a proper balance between studies and recreation. The principal said central year had a special significance for Miscouche as it was on September 5, 1964 that the Miscouche Convent and day school opened its doors.

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N.B. Recount In Restigouche Elects Liberals

FREDERICTON (CP)—After nearly a month and a half of official haggling over validity of New Brunswick's April 22 provincial election results, three more Liberals have taken their seats in the legislature.

An official recount in Restigouche has been completed and Premier Robichaud announced in the legislature that the three winning Liberals would be sworn in as members of the 52-seat house.

The recount had been requested by Progressive Conservatives who claimed irregularities in the election might count.

Legislature standings now are 30 Liberals, 18 PCs and four seats are vacant.

The four vacant seats will be filled upon completion of recounts in Saint John City.

Philadelphia Fair Planned

OTTAWA (CP)—The trade department is poised for a big splash in Philadelphia. It has nearly completed plans

for a classy "solo" trade fair—Canadian only—for Nov. 11-16 in a big hotel in the new Penn Centre.

Nearly all available space for 100 Canadian exhibitors has been taken up. On display will be wide range of goods including furniture, baby exercisers, canoes

and snow boots, high-fidelity cabinets, food and outdoor gear.

The aim is to crack one of the fattest of all United States markets, one lying in New York's shadow and often overlooked by Canadian salesmen, partly because Philadelphia is not on a direct air route from Canada.

One yardstick of the market is that within a 100-mile radius of Philadelphia is a population bigger than Canada's, with a cash income estimated at \$3,000,000,000—greater than Canada's entire gross national product.

Cost to the government will be about \$200,000.
