discussed briefly and was favorably received, pending further study and plans. Tents would be available if the girls decided to go camping and the beautiful Mill River is close and an ideal location for a camp. The Y. P. O'Leary has always been most fortunate in the splendid calibre and professional ability of its teaching staff. The young people who received their elementary training in the O'Leary School and who continued their studies at Prince of Wales College in Charlottetown and in the mainland universities, have found no difficulty in maintaining credible showings and in securing their full share of prizes and scholarships.

Col. Wilfred Bovey, president of the hospital said the hospital has received a grant from the federal government to carry out a "pilot project" in the care of patients in their homes rather than in hospital beds.

During the past few years various New York hospitals have extended hospital care to patients' homes. The patient remains under the care of his physician and nurses and internes visit him at his home.

The patient will leave the hospital at an earlier date than usual under the Reddy plan and spend the period before complete convalescence at home.

Internes will visit the patient daily under direction of the physician and make reports as if the patient were still in hospital.

"One main difference between our scheme and that in force in New York," said Col. Bovey, "is that New York hospitals are dealing with patients who are public charges and the entire operation is at public expense."

"In our plan the patient, while not paying as much as he would in hospital, will be expected to contribute and when the experiment is over we hope the Home care section will be self-supporting."
