

# This Year's World Series May Open On October 3

NEW YORK, Sept. 6 (AP)—Barring play-offs, the World Series will open on Wednesday, Oct. 3, unless Cleveland wins the American League pennant, in which case it will start Thursday, Oct. 4, in Cleveland.

Representatives of the pennant contenders decided today in a three-hour meeting to keep the same ticket scale as last year and eliminated any open days for travel.

Attending the meeting were Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Giants of the National League, and Cleveland Indians, New York Yankees and Boston Red Sox of the American League.

Tickets will cost \$8.00 for box seats, \$6.00 for reserved seats, \$4.00 for standing room and \$1.00 for bleacher seats.

The series opens this year in the American League park where he first two games will be played, followed by three games in the National League park, and then two in the American—if more than four games are needed in the best-of-seven competition.

In the event of a tie in the National League, the playoff by league rule is a best two-of-three series. This could delay the start of the series.

In case of a two-way tie in the American League, a single game settles it. A three-way tie would require two games—the first to eliminate one of the contenders, and the second to settle the flag race.

For the first time this year a new baseball rule comes into play. If, when the season ends on Sunday, Sept. 30, any games postponed by bad weather still have a bearing on the race they can be played on Monday and Tuesday in the American League. The National League has set aside only Monday for such contests.

## Accused "Fixer" Surrenders

NEW YORK, Sept. 6 (AP)—Jack (Zip) West, 40, accused as a fixer in college basketball scandal, gave himself up today because I'm tired of living like a hunted animal.

He was held in \$50,000 bail, charged with bribery and conspiracy. West pleaded innocent.

A country-wide manhunt had been on for him since he was indicted in July. He was charged with offering a \$10,000 bribe to Gene Melchiorre, Bradley University's All-American, to throw a 1950 championship basketball game with City College of New York. Melchiorre said he turned down the bribe.

## Jack Stewart Signs Contract

CHICAGO, Sept. 6 (AP)—Jack Stewart, star defence player whose hockey career was believed ended last December when a disc was removed from his spine, today signed a 1951 contract with Chicago Black Hawks.

Stewart, 34, a 12-year veteran of the National Hockey League was reported in top shape by a Black Hawks physician who termed his recovery "most remarkable."

After medical examination following a serious back injury in an N. H. L. game, it was reported Stewart would never play again.

Stewart said he got his back strengthened by hard work on his wheat farm in Manitoba.

## World Anglers Gather For Tuna Cup Match

WEDGEPORT, N. S., Sept. 6 (CP)—World anglers are converging on this quaint Acadian fishing village for the eighth international tuna cup match on nearby Soldier's Rip Sept. 12-15.

And the Sharp Trophy, much-travelled since the first match began in 1937, is ready for the winning team.

Most squads include veterans of former matches. But newcomers, all top-ranking anglers, arrived earlier to gain experience on Soldier's Rip, world-famed hangout of the battling blues.

Frederic Weisner of Santiago will again captain Chile's team, winner of the 1950 tournament. Weisner's squad, which will arrive tomorrow, includes Eduardo Reyes Corda, Carlos De Pena, Joaquin Cruzat, Luis Reyes Langlois, Benjamin Claro Velasco, all of Santiago, and Manuel De Pena of Valparaiso.

The British Empire team will be captained this year by Cmdr. Duncan M. Hodgson of Montreal, who last year set a world's record by landing a 97-pound tuna.

The United States team, two-time winner, will be captained by Tony Hulman, Jr., of Terre Haute, Ind., a member of the U. S. team the last three years, a former all-American football player and chairman of the board of the Indianapolis Speedway.

Anglers from Canada, England, Australia, Bermuda, South Africa, Chile, Cuba, Sweden, Denmark and the United States have landed 279 tuna this season.

The winner took the last two dashes but the fastest time, 2:09 4-5, was set by Donald G. R., owned by W. M. Fleming, of Juniper in capturing the first dash.

The west end Anchors were the only team that did not have a pitcher in action and their pitching ace, Charlie Ryan will likely be on the mound against the Summerside Intermediates on Sunday.

City League President Danny McCormack stated last night that it would likely be sometime next week before the City League semi-finals are resumed. The Anchors and Stars are tied up at one game each while the Rovers lead Buck Whitlock's Falcons one game to nothing.

The first game of the Intermediate series showed that the Abbies possess potent batting power in the number three, four and five spots in the persons of Gus Flynn, "Buck" Whitlock, and Glen Matheson. ## NBC Gets Series TV Rights

NBC president Joseph H. McCone said this year's telecasts of the baseball classic—first to go coast-to-coast—would be over a network covering areas with 80,000,000 of the country's population.

Television and radio rights to the series are held by the Gillette Safety Razor Co. Radio broadcasts will be over the Mutual Broadcasting System network.

## Yankees, Red Sox Games Washed Out

NEW YORK, Sept. 6 (AP)—Persistent rain washed out today's doubleheader between New York Yankees and Boston Red Sox, making it necessary for the two teams to play eight games against each other during the final 10 days of the baseball season.

Today's games have been rescheduled as part of doubleheaders here on Friday and Saturday, Sept. 28 and 29. The teams are listed for a single game on the season's final day Sunday, Sept. 30, which makes the series a five-game affair.

On Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 21-22-23, the Yankees and Red Sox are scheduled to play a three-game series in Boston, where the New Yorkers have yet to win a game this season.

St. Louis Cardinals slugged the offerings of four pitchers for 11 hits, including four home runs, a triple and two doubles, for a 10-2 National League victory over Chicago Cubs Thursday.

The bombardment was led by Hal Rice, whose fourth home run to the year and a triple drove in four runs, and Billy Johnson, who hammered home three runs with his 12th homer, a double and a single.

Stan Musial added his 52nd homer, in addition to a single, and Red Schoendienst his sixth home run.

Chicago White Sox trounced St. Louis Browns 9-4 in an American League night game at St. Louis. Randy Gumpert held the Browns to seven hits and rapped out four singles himself in a 17-hit bombardment by Chicago.

Pittsburgh Pirate defeated Cincinnati Reds 7-4 in another night fixture to move into a tie with the Reds for sixth place in the National League. The game, at Forbes Field, was delayed one hour and 14 minutes by rain.

The remainder of the major league schedule was washed out by rain.

## Stellarton Wins Halifax League

HALIFAX, Sept. 6 (CP)—Stellarton Albions tonight won the Halifax and District Senior Baseball League title, downing Halifax Capitals 5-2 in a best-of-seven series.

Albions, one of the best teams in the H-D League has ever seen, took the series 4-1, with one game tied.

Joe Pardon pitched four-hit ball before the game was called in the seventh because of darkness. He struck out 11 batters.

Meanwhile, Capitals announced after a seventh-inning play they would protest the game. Later tonight, however, the protest had not been officially filed with H-D League officials.

The protest was a result of a decision at third base. Leroy Sires was on second when Keany smashed a single to deep left. Sires made the turn at third but missed the bag. Capitals' catcher Bob Fitzgerald received the ball from the outfield and tagged third base.

Umpire Hoppl MacDonald called Sires out but umpire-in-chief John McBride reversed the decision. He said the ball must be returned to the pitcher before it could be put into play again.

## Season's Largest Tuna Landed

WEDGEPORT, N. S., Sept. 6 (CP)—The season's largest tuna was landed yesterday by New York angler Ed Mayer. It weighed 78 pounds.

Mayer, a veteran Atlantic coast angler, landed the battling blunfin in the fast time of 48 minutes.

Four women, including a Canadian, were among this week's successful fishermen. Dorothy Deveau Elmhurst, N. Y., landed a 664-pounder and Georgia Bertrand Montreal, hooked one weighing 820 pounds. Mrs. John Carter of Morristown, N. J., caught a 558-pounder.

Total weight of tuna taken by rod and line this season is more than 130,000 pounds, about 60 per cent ahead of the same time last year.

## Radio Fund For San. Discussed

Ways and means of increasing the Provincial Sanatorium Radio Fund were discussed at a meeting last night in the City Chambers. Mayor B. Earle MacDonald presided, with the chairman of the sub-committees of the Fund Organization in attendance.

It was revealed that while a gratifying total of some two thousand dollars has been achieved so far, the number of contributors represents a small cross-section of the Island population. Some general personal and organizational donations have been received, notable among the latter being seven hundred dollars from the Provincial Women's Institutes and two hundred and fifty dollars from the Charlottetown Rotary Club.

The Radio Fund is planned to provide radio entertainment for all patients in the Sanatorium, including polio patients, replacing the present inadequate and worn-out equipment. The point was raised during the meeting that the Sanatorium is a Provincial institution, and that upwards of two-thirds of the present total has been donated by citizens and organizations within the Charlottetown urban district. It was stressed that ways and means of enabling all centres in the three counties to contribute should be investigated.

In order to realize the necessary amount as quickly as possible, so that installation may commence at an early date, it was agreed that an announcement would be made in the press as soon as a plan could be formulated to accomplish this aim.
