

New Charges Expected Against John H. Reid

John Henry Reid, operator of Johnny's Fish and Chips, was found guilty of operating a restaurant without a license in City Police Court yesterday morning.

He was fined \$50 and costs by Magistrate A. J. Haslam.

Crown Prosecutor Alan Scates told Mr. Reid to remain in the courtroom after he had been fined, as the Crown had some more information to lay against him.

Mr. Reid decided not to stay and he left with his attorney Allison Gillis. He informed Mr. Scates that he could summon Reid if he wanted him in court.

It is thought that the Crown will lay several other informations within a short time.

The court was told by Mr. Gillis that John Reid always had a license when he operated the restaurant, but since June 1963 his sister, Elizabeth Reid, operated the business. Mr. Reid was travelling with a carnival.

IN HER NAME

Mr. Gillis maintained the license should have been in the name of Elizabeth Reid.

Regarding the Partnership Act he stated this was for protection of the business name and if John Henry Reid had not changed the name on the partnership agreement it might have meant that failure to do so made him responsible for any debts.

Mr. Gillis maintained if the license granted were valid then the notice to close should have been served on Betty Reid as she had bought the last license granted. He said the fact the restaurant was still open was an indicative of doubt on the part of officials regarding the charges and any doubt should be resolved in favor of defendant.

had been cancelled by the authorities as a result of an inspection by the provincial health officers and notice was served on the accused. However, the restaurant continued to carry on business and to remain open contrary to the city by-law relating to restaurants.

Regarding ownership of the business, he noted there had been no changes as required by the Partnership Act since the declaration of partnership filed several years ago; that the provincial sales tax application was originally made in the name of or by the accused; the original restaurant license obtained in the name of accused and no change noted in ownership; under cross-examination, various witnesses thought so far as they were concerned that the restaurant was owned by accused; two employees were not prepared to say definitely the accused did not own it.

Regarding certain County Court proceedings in June 1964, the Magistrate noted an affidavit sworn by Betty Reid, who now claims she owned the restaurant for the past year and a half, identified the accused as the person doing business under the name Johnny's Fish and Chips; Betty Reid, in her evidence, stated she had withdrawn from the business certain monies for her personal use and was not prepared to state to whom the remainder of the money in the business belonged; the agreement between the accused and his sister was very loose; a day when approached by the City Health Officer, Dr. MacDonald, the accused had been very unco-operative.

Summing up for the Crown, Mr. Scates said no mistake had been made "or we would not be here" and stated the notice was properly served. He said the proper procession of witnesses called by the accused had added nothing to his case and had represented a waste of time. "Essentially the business was conducted the same in the past year as before".

ASKS MAXIMUM

In asking for a conviction he also requested the maximum penalty as it represented, a 10 merely a breach of a by-law but constituted a serious offence as it represented a flagrant violation of the law.

Eight Areas in Province Reach United Fund Quotas

Areas reaching their quotas are: Central Queens, \$2,133; Charlottetown Rural Regional, \$8,272; Englewood, \$2,274; Kensington, \$2,579; Kinkora, \$1,418; Montague, \$8,390; Souris, \$4,832; and Stella Mars, \$1,008.

Mayor Gaudet said, however, "we have three flagstaffs and I hope during my time to always see the new flag flanked by the Union Jack and the Red Ensign."

Campania chairman Frank MacDonald said he was confident three other areas would reach their objective before the campaign closes. The remainder of the regional high school districts and Charlottetown and Summerside have fallen just short of their quotas.

Mr. W.W. Reid, president of the campaign, termed the year one of achievement for the fund, said each person associated with the campaign could take pride in being a part of the year's efforts.

"The dollar value of our campaign is not the only success we can claim; we have also succeeded in creating the largest single, enthusiastic volunteer organization in the province."

Prov. Cabinet Discussions 'Just Routine'

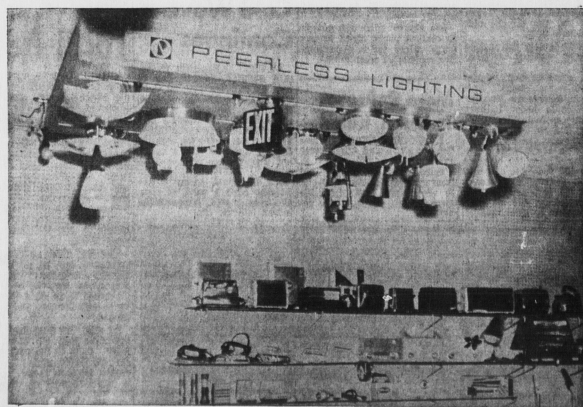
