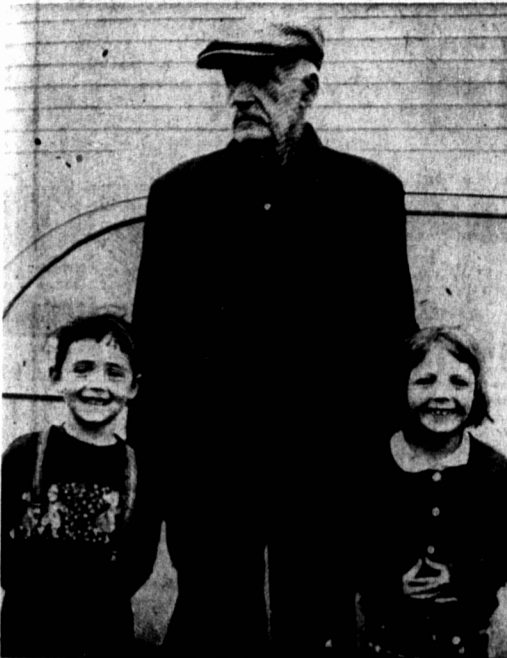


HILLSBOROUGH CONTRACT ONE FIFTH COMPLETED

One fifth of the fill in the northern portion of Hillsborough Causeway has now been placed, according to F.W. Curtis of the Hillsborough Construction Company who have the contract for the work. The 250,000 yard mark was reached yesterday. It will take an estimated 1,200,000 yards to complete the job started on August 29. Work is progressing twenty hours a day with giant carryalls dumping loads every few minutes.
