Fatality Mars Grand Prix Sat.

WATKINS GLEN, N.Y. (AP)—Walt Hansen of Westfield, N.J., won the 15th running of the Watkins Glen Grand Prix sports car race Saturday by a wide margin. He was driving a Cooper.

"The race was marred by the death of veteran driver A. M. (Bud) Faxon of Wilkes-Barre, Pa., who was killed when his Lotus Buick ran off course midway through the race, hitting two trees.

The race was held at the Watkins Glen International Raceway, which was the site of the first ever Grand Prix race in 1950. Faxon's death was the first sports car racing fatality at Watkins Glen since 1950, and the first ever at the present race track. The only other sports car racing death here was that of Sam Collier, who was killed while driving the 1950 Grand Prix.

Witnesses said if Faxon's car had been driving 100 miles an hour, went off the course in a fast right-hand corner known as the "big bend."

Big Mutua Days Feature Program

The intriguing boxer vs. slugger bout is scheduled for 10:30 p.m. EDT, with a "live" park audience of perhaps 30,000 to 35,000.

For those in the United States and Canada watching out on television, the fight will be broadcast nationally over the ABC radio network in the U.S. and over the Trans-Canada network of the C.R.C.

A record 63 working newspaper men requested seats from the sponsoring Championship Sports, Incorporated.

Liston, expected to weigh around 210, is rated an early 7-to-5 favorite over the 188-pound Patterson, making a third defence since regaining the title in the middle match of an epic three-bout series with Sweden's Eric Johansson.

IT'S HIS BIG ONE
The odds may slim down by Tuesday's official noon weigh-in time, but the feeling generally is that Patterson, decked by far less potent punchers than Liston, will have to unleash the fight of his life to conquer the challenger. Against Johansson Liston was down only once in total of nine times in their three knockout-ending bouts.

Embittered by publicity over his prison past and what he claims is a beggar's (12½ per cent) share of the rich fight receipts, Liston will be as dedicated a fighter as Patterson Tuesday night.

The 28-year-old Liston, a year older than Patterson and obviously the most jolting left jab since Joe Louis. He lacks the combination punching finesse of Patterson, but can hurt as much with his right hand.

Liston's record is 23 knockouts in 34 bouts, marked by only one loss. In 40 pro fights Patterson has scored 29 knockouts and lost only twice—a 1954 decision to clever Joey Maxon and his third-round KO by Johansson in New York, June 26, 1959.

Liston's only defeat came in 1954 when, suffering a broken jaw, he yielded an eight-round decision to Marly Marshall. But the brawny challenger later twice whipped Marshall and still has to be knocked down or seriously cut.

TAKES GET RESULTS
Liston touted Patterson into this title match, claiming the champion was running away from him and using Liston's prison record as an excuse not to fight him.

The decision may cost Patterson his title, but he will be soothed by a take of more than \$1,000,000 from his 55 per cent of net ancillary (closed circuit TV, etc.) receipts, and 45 per cent of the net live gate.

Also, a victorious Liston must give Patterson a return match within a year, and have all except \$90,000 of his purse of a minimum \$200 held in escrow until the condition is met.

Championship sports said in the event of rain Tuesday, the fight will be closed circuit TV setup is arranged for holding the bout Wednesday or Thursday.
