

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

EUROPEAN.

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.

The *World's* London correspondent hears that Germany, France and Austria have entered into private engagement not to exert any further pressure upon Porto provided it consented to give up Dulcigno, and that consequently if Gladstone now persists in his policy it will be an alliance with Russia only. Leading supporters of Gladstone's administration now admit privately of course that war is almost inevitable at a very early date, probably in the spring of 1881. Greeks are determined to obtain possession of Janina at all hazards and cost, and Gladstone is as resolute in his determination to help them, while Turkey will yield no money, indeed can yield no more.

The *Tribune's* cable despatch says Prince Randolph of Austria is reported to have made a bold bid for a new alliance by suggesting that Salonica be a fair compensation for a Russian Stamboul. It seems incredible that an heir to the Austrian throne should deliberately advocate an alliance with Russia.

ROME, Oct. 17.

Deritte says that Admiral Seymour has intimated an opinion in favor of entrusting the supervision of the surrender of Dulcigno to the diplomatic agents accredited to Montenegro rather than to the naval forces. Italy has consented to this suggestion.

DUBLIN, Oct. 16.

It is conceded on all hands that a breach has been created between the priesthood and the Land League, which will soon widen into a complete rupture, owing to Archbishop McCabe's denunciations, which will have great weight throughout the country.

It is believed thirteen of the most prominent Land Leaguers will be prosecuted.

LONDON, Oct. 17.

At a monster Land meeting at Langford, to-day, Parnell said the solution of the Land question would depend upon the efforts of the Irish people during the winter. He insisted above all on the necessity of organization. All measures of the Government against agitation would fail before the united organized people. Government could imprison individuals, but never an entire nation.

DUBLIN, Oct. 14.

The approaching prosecution of the Land League leaders, which has been determined upon, has created a panic in their ranks, as they did not for an instant imagine that the Government would dare to take such action. The blow has fallen without the slightest warning. It has been determined by the Government to prosecute the leading agitators for a conspiracy to resist the laws. The law officers of the Crown will meet at the Castle to-day at ten o'clock to determine the form of the summons and line of procedure, which will be presented first in the police courts and then in the superior courts. The prosecution is founded on the proceedings of the Land League in the city of Dublin and on the speeches delivered at some of the county meetings, the speeches at which have been reported by Government short-hand writers. Immense satisfaction is felt here at the prospect of the prosecution of the Land League. At the meeting of the Privy Council in the Castle, which was presided over by the Lord Lieutenant, the Crown Solicitor and the Crown Prosecutor for Dublin submitted an opinion that the prosecution should be by a criminal information in the Court of Queen's Bench division. If the authorities do not alter their minds a motion will be made on the first day of the term, November 2, for a conditional order for criminal information against Mr. Parnell and the other leaders of the Land League. A long legal argument will ensue when the parties will appear to show cause why the order should not be made absolute. The whole question of the legality or illegality of leagues will then be gone into. Criminal information can be lodged against a body for conspiracy to interfere with the due execution of the Queen's laws or against individuals for using language at country meetings calculated to endanger the safety of a certain person or persons. It has not been decided which course will be adopted, but a leading law officer has informed the *Herald* correspondent that probably the prosecution would take a dual form and include both Mr. Parnell, who returns from England to-morrow, will certainly speak at Longford on Sunday. It is expected that he will deal principally with the pastoral letter of Archbishop McCabe and the impending action of the Government. Mr. Forster called at the castle to-day and had an interview with the Lord Lieutenant. The more daring members of the Land League are jubilant at the prospect of a struggle, while others are apprehensive of the double effect of a prosecution and the attitude of the Roman Catholic hierarchy. A despatch to the *Standard* from Dublin says that in view of the abortive proceedings against Messrs. Davitt, Daly and Killen the government has abandoned the idea of proceeding by summons or arrest and has determined to move on the 2nd November, in the Queen's Bench Division, for a conditional order for criminal information against the leaders of the Land League. The correspondent of the *News* at Dublin says:—"It is reported in well informed circles that the government does not intend to proceed against such men as Parnell, Flanagan and O'Connor, but against members of local branches who participate in the prevention of bidding for farms from which tenants have been evicted."

LONDON, Oct. 16.

It is rumored that Earl Dufferin will succeed E. J. Goschen as British Ambassador to Turkey.

The commanders of the French and German war vessels of the allied fleet in Turkish waters has been ordered home. No further naval proceedings are expected.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 17.

A herd of goats from Angora, intended for acclimatization in Canada and Cape Colony, were attacked at Ismid by Circassian brigands and a portion stolen. Mr. Goschen, British Ambassador, has made a representation to the Porte concerning this matter.

BADSCIC, Oct. 16.

Admiral Seymour has been informed that the Turks are placing torpedoes for the defence of Smyrna.

The cessation of Dulcigno is regarded as practically accomplished.

A Turkish commission has been appointed to superintend proposed reforms in Turkey.

GENEVA, Oct. 16.

The contractors of St. Gothard tunnel have asked for 700 more days for the completion of the tunnel. The line will not be opened for traffic until late in 1883.

CAPE TOWN, Oct. 16.

A messenger from the besieged in Mafeking reports the garrison can subsist on horse flesh until the end of the month. The relief force will therefore be delayed until the reinforcements on the way can join it.

PARIS, Oct. 16.

To-day (Saturday) the execution of the decrees begin with the Carmelites in Paris and in about a dozen departments.

LONDON, Oct. 15.

Don Candido Bareiro, President of Paraguay, is dead. Gen. Cabalero has succeeded him.

UNITED STATES.

DENVER, Col., Oct. 17.

A conflict with the Utes seems imminent. Yesterday two companies of military left Gunnison City for the reservation to arrest agent Berry and others.

MILWAUKEE, Oct. 17.

A wind storm which prevailed here last night was the severest ever known in this section, and the barometer was never known to be so low. Wind was from the south, blowing between sixty and seventy miles an hour. A large fleet of vessels sought this harbor for safety and rode out the gale in the bay. The storm all along the Southern Minnesota Railway is the severest known in years. Passenger and freight trains along the line were blockaded in snow drifts from ten to twelve feet deep, and teams, with provisions have been dispatched to their relief from several points. The train which left Lacrosse on Friday has not been heard from since leaving Fulda that night.

All the cuts west of Fairmount are filled with snow packed hard. Reports of cattle, horses, etc., having perished, are constantly being received, but no loss of human life has yet been reported. The worst storm ever known in southern Minnesota and eastern Dakota is still raging. A long list of disasters is expected when the reports come in from the east shore ports.

CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 17.

During the storm last night the schr. B. W. Wells, bound in, with iron ore, from Escanaba, foundered off North Chicago. Her mast alone remained above water. Her crew consisted of Capt. D. Hierkauff and seven seamen, who have not been heard from and are supposed to have perished.

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.

The *Sunday News* says: "A clique composed of a dozen or two very wealthy Republican capitalists of Wall street, on Tuesday morning received cipher despatches from agents at Indianapolis, Ind., reporting that from an extremely careful canvass of the State they had figured up a Republican majority of about 5000 votes. They immediately began to buy stocks, and on Wednesday morning, on announced success of the Republican party in both Ohio and Indiana, the boom was fully inaugurated."

LIMA, Sept. 22—1 p. m.

Chilians are carrying out their threat. The boom of their guns at Charrillas and Callao are distinctly heard. The meeting of the diplomatic body last night came to nothing. All agreed they could do nothing to protect the threatened towns.
