

Danny Lewicki Scores Twice As Rangers Win

NEW YORK (AP)—Young Quackenbush, Flaman; forwards: Danny Lewicki, 23-year-old left wing purchased from Toronto during the summer, scored two goals Wednesday night as the rejuvenated New York Rangers defeated the Boston Bruins 6-2 in the first National Hockey League of the season at Madison Square Garden.

The Rangers, making their home debut, led all the way as coach Muzz Patrick renewed his rivalry with brother Lynn, the Bruins' coach. Veteran centre Don Raleigh gave Rangers a 1-0 lead in the first period. His hard shot caromed in off a Boston player's skate after goalie Sugar Jim Henry had made the stop. Rangers capitalized on a short-handed Boston club to score two goals in 18 seconds to open the middle period. Ivan Irwin of Rangers and Flem MacKell were waved with double minor penalties after a 44 second fracas. They were joined by Boston's Fernie Flaman who was judged for tripping. On a power play Harry Howell scored the range at 10:08 and at 10:26 Lewicki scored his first tally. Rookie Don McKenney scored his fifth goal of the season, with Boston's first goal of the game before the halfway mark of the second. Lewicki made it 4-1 in the third with his second counter. Andy Bathgate made it 5-1 followed by Flaman 44 seconds later. Dean Prentice rounded out the scoring.

Alvin Dark Becomes Highest Paid Of Giants

NEW YORK (AP)—Alvin Dark Wednesday signed a New York Giant contract that made him the highest-paid player in the history of the club. The soft-spoken and highly-efficient shortstop, called by manager Leo Durocher, the "heart and guts" of the ball clubs, affixed his signature to a two-year contract calling for \$36,500 a year.

Although no terms were announced, it was reliably learned the scrappy team captain was given a raise of \$5,000 over his \$31,500 earnings of 1953 and 1954. Dark's contract thus exceeds by \$500 the previous high of \$36,000 given pitcher Sal Maglie in 1952. Bill Terry and Mel Ott both made more money but only when they doubled as player and manager. Dark was the first to sign with the world champions for 1955. Alvin's last signing was in somewhat different atmosphere. That one ended the only holdout problem confronted by the Giants. The club and Dark didn't reach an agreement until March 3, after the start of spring training.

The all-around athlete wound up a superb season with an individual performance that matched the team showing this year. He played in every game, batted .293 and had a fielding average of .956. His 139 hits included 20 home runs and 70 runs batted in.

It will be the second time Mayer has replaced the Vezina trophy winner in the Leaf nets. He played one game last year when Lumley injured his leg.

Considers Damages Suit In Sale Of Athletics

CHICAGO (AP)—Arnold Johnson, Chicago's industrialist who wants to move Philadelphia Athletics franchise to Kansas City, said Wednesday night that he is considering a suit for "substantial" damages against the Philadelphia syndicate that bought the Athletics. "I feel that I have been wronged by the Philadelphia group who so suddenly appeared on the scene, and propose to get my legal remedy," Johnson said in a statement. "In view of the indicated advance ticket sale in Kansas City of almost two million dollars, the measure of my damages should be substantial." Arthur Rosenberg, one of the Philadelphia group members, who has been acting as spokesman for the others, said he wanted time to consider the Johnson statement personally before issuing any rebuttal and said the syndicate as a whole probably would feel likewise. Roy Mack, executive vice-president of the Athletics, was not available immediately for comment. "I must emphasize," Johnson continued, "that this action is not directed in any manner against the American League or any of the club owners, all of whom in my opinion have acted in the best of faith, as have I, throughout this entire transaction." Johnson charged Roy Mack with violating an agreement made in good faith.



A subject which is presently of interest to many hockey fans around the Maritimes is the one concerning the statement made by Jack MacDougal, president of the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association, earlier this week. MacDougal said that players who jump the MAHA-registered club to join the Newfoundland Hockey League will be suspended automatically for two years. The statement followed complaints by members of the APC league that alleged player raids were being made by the Newfoundland circuit which is not affiliated with the MAHA, and was a consequence of a scouting trip by none other than Grand Falls coach, Weston (Busko) Trainor of Charlottetown.

Last week-end, before he came to the Island for several days visit, Busko took a run through Nova Scotia and was successful in obtaining the services of defenceman Stan MacDougal and Neil Amadio for the coming season with the Grand Falls Papermakers. Both men played with teams participating in the now defunct MMHL of last year. Jobs are beginning to get scarce for the amateur hockey player with teams folding almost every day. So why shouldn't they take a job wherever they can obtain one? As one player recently stated: "Hockey clubs in Newfoundland are not likely to fold in mid-season, throwing a \$125-a-week performer into the ranks of the unemployed."

Today is the final day of practice for the teams of the newly formed Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League who open their 1954-55 64 game schedule in Fredericton and Amherst on Friday night. The four teams, Charlottetown, Moncton, Fredericton and Amherst, have been busy training since last week-end and promise to give fans a good deal of variety and many new faces. Island fans especially are due to watch a lot of new performers since three of the four teams in the ACSHL have not played here in several years.

Hughie Campbell has paced the Islanders into fine shape and they should be as ready as any team for the tough season grind ahead. His defence at present is just as strong, if not stronger, than last season's blue line boys. In nets is Jim Shirley, a 25-year-old chap from Saskatchewan who has looked very impressive in workout sessions and who had a goal-against average of 3.71 in the NOHA last year. On the blue line he has three experienced men along with two locals. They are Copper Leyte, Danny O'Connor, Steve Bkklach, Junior MacLeod and Stu MacLure. Cooper last season played with Quebec Aces and Glace Bay Miners while Danny performed for part of the season with St. John's of the NOHA and while with the local squad was a stand-out in the play-offs against Atlantic Steve who landed from an Upper Canadian camp yesterday played with the Islanders two years ago while Junior and Stu have had junior experience with several Nova Scotia teams.

The more experienced forwards' camp include Johnny Morrow, Buck Whitlock, Hughie Campbell, Ray LeDuc, Lorne Hennessey, and Cecil Dowling. Guy Gignac is expected to join the team shortly.

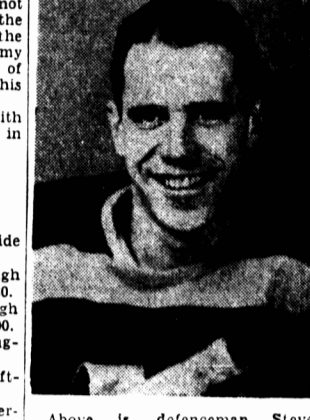
Campanella Has Operation On Hand

NEW YORK (AP)—Roy Campanella, Brooklyn Dodgers catcher, underwent a four-hour operation on his left hand Wednesday. It was the second time in less than six months that Campanella had to go under the knife. The same hand was operated on last May for the removal of bone chips causing a four-week layoff and reducing his batting effectiveness considerably. The second operation was found necessary to release adhesions which had caused partial paralysis of the ulnar nerve. Neurosurgeon Dr. Samuel H. Schenkman, with Dr. Lyndon Hill assisting, performed the operation. "There is an excellent chance that Campanella's hand would return to normal," said Dr. Hill. "More will be known in from four to six weeks when further tests will be made."

Swiss See U.S. Aiming To Cripple Watch Industry

BERN, Switzerland, (Reuters)—The president of the Swiss Federation of Watch Manufacturers, Maurice Vaucher, Wednesday accused the United States of following a carefully prepared plan to cripple the watch industry. He was referring to an anti-trust action which has been launched by the U. S. department of justice against 17 American watch companies and organizations and six major Swiss watch firms with offices in the United States. The suit charges illegal agreements in the marketing of watches. "This action can only be construed as a further indication that the United States is treating Switzerland as a commercial enemy," he said. He noted that import tariffs on Swiss watches were raised by 50 per cent last July. Vaucher said the Swiss people could not understand how the U. S. could take such actions when it so glibly and consistently proclaims the virtues of competitive free enterprise and gives lip service to the idea of "trade not aid." The Swiss government in a communique Wednesday said the American anti-trust accusations were "a direct threat" to the Swiss industry. It said Swiss authorities are examining the accusations.



Saxton Wins Welterweight Title From "Kid" Gavilan

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Sturdy Johnny Saxton, fighting a cautious counter-punching battle, stripped listless Kid Gavilan of his world welterweight title Wednesday night on a unanimous decision in a dull 15-round bout at Convention Hall. The 24-year-old new champion, a New York Golden Glove grad, won the votes of all three officials after a battle marred by much holding, wrestling, tugging and shoving. At times it looked more like a wrestling match than a fight. "It was a lousy fight," said chairman Frank Wiener of the Pennsylvania athletic commission. "But I guess they did as well as they could." The disappointing crowd of 7,909, paying a gross gate of \$57,121 to see the nationally televised bout (Philadelphia area blacked out) cheered the upset victory by a boy who has done most of his main bout fighting in Philadelphia.

Only in the closing minutes, when the Cuban Keed staged his only real Gavilan-style burst of action did the customers warm up. The final burst had them cheering at the end, the only real outburst of the scrap. Saxton fought a counter-punching scrap, moving inside and trying to batter Gavilan when he surged in. The decision seemed to strike a receptive chord with the crowd, but it didn't agree with the cards of the working press. Referee Felix Pantaleo scored it 9-6, judge Jimmy Mays 7-6-2 and judge Nat Lopinson 8-6-1, all for Saxton.

Gets \$12,000 In Error, Logger Ends Up In Jail

VANCOUVER (CP)—Emil Anderson, 54-year-old logger who received \$12,000 in a case of mistaken identity, Wednesday was sentenced to six months in prison for spending \$7,500 of it. In convicting Anderson on a charge of obtaining money under false pretences, Magistrate Oscar Orr said: "It's a fantastic story, not only from his point of view, but from the bank's too. The temptations were very great..."

Anderson received a letter from a Salmon Arm, B.C., bank telling him of a \$12,000 account in his name. "I thought a lady friend had deposited the money," he said in court.

The bank discovered two months later that the Emil Anderson they were looking for had gone to Sweden. By that time, the other Anderson had spent approximately \$7,500.

Anderson's sister said it was "very unusual" when he arrived home in a taxi he had taken from Chase, 325 miles northeast of here, wearing new clothes. "Usually," she said, "when he arrived home in a taxi, he had no clothes—the drivers took them off him because he couldn't pay the fare."
