New Outbreak Of Foot And Mouth Disease

Korean War Has Cost Canada 100 Million To Date, Committee Learns

OTTAWA, April 22 —(CP)—The commons defence committee, probing military spending learned today that it has cost Canada about \$100,000,000 to date for Korea.

The original figure indicated by statistics was \$102,000,000 up to the end of January. This later was amended to \$92,000,000 by the department when a discrepancy was found in one of the sub-totals.

But the costs of the last three months would undoubtedly put the bill up to the end of April in the area of \$100,000,000 again.

The \$92,000,000 total included \$73,900,000 to train, feed, equip and pay transport and maintain the Army's 25th Brigade and supporting units; \$10,900,000 for the air-lift, about half for the R.C.A.F. and half for Canadian Pacific Air Lines; and \$7,700,000 for the navy.

Interesting Figures
The committee starting 15 minutes late for lack of a quorum of 14, also learned from a pile of tabulated figures that:

1. Bills for the 27th Brigade now in Germany, amounted to nearly \$15,000,000 by the end of January.

2. About \$60,000,000 worth of guns and ammunition Canada has offered for shipment to

Officer Is Held In Theft Of Army Supplies



Captain Donald W. Baldock, seen at right, of the Royal Canadian Engineers, has been arrested along with four civilians by RCMP at Pembroke, Ont., on charges of conspiracy and theft as a result of investigation into large-scale thefts from the nearby Petawawa military camp.

Mr. Baldock, a native of Brandon, Man., joined the army in 1944, directly upon graduating from the University of Manitoba with a degree of Bachelor of Science in engineering.

The investigation has concerned the removal from the big military camp of a long list of material and items of equipment including steel rails, scrap metal, stores and cement blocks.

Death In Halifax Of J. J. Murphy

HALIFAX, April 22 —(CP)—John J. Murphy, president of two Nova Scotia companies, died suddenly in his office today following a heart attack. He was 45.

Mr. Murphy was the third John Murphy to be president of J. and M. Murphy, Ltd., a family business established in 1873 which has grown to be one of the largest wholesale dry goods houses in Canada.

Gardiner Gives Warning Against Dumping Tactics

OTTAWA, April 22 —(CP)—A new outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease was announced today, shattering Canada's hopes of an early end to the United States embargo on Canadian livestock and meats.

The announcement, made in the commons by Agriculture Minister Gardiner, sparked uneasiness among some marketing experts that it will lead to jitteriness among cattle men and to "dumping" of cattle on markets in fear of sharply declining prices next fall.

Mr. Gardiner cautioned against such a move. He outlined the government's floor price on beef and said there always will be a support price until the U.S. market is restored to Canadian exporters.

The new outbreak will result in slaughtering of another 23 animals. It was uncovered on a farm a few miles southeast of Ormiston, about 100 miles southwest of Regina and about five miles outside the 11-municipality South Saskatchewan quarantine area.

Widen Quarantine Area
However, it is well within the 50 miles buffer zone erected to prevent the disease from spreading.

ATOM BOMB SITE, Nev., April 22 (AP)—An atom bomb, its scaring heat and blast of unusual ferocity, was exploded today as 1,500 troops huddled in foxholes along an atomic warfare "battle-front."

The soldiers were unharmed by the explosion, proving that foxholes can shelter men from even the world's most destructive weapon. Seconds after the explosion of the bomb—dropped from a B-50 and detonated at 3,500 feet only about 3-1/2 miles from the troops—the soldiers and the generals who were with them stood up and laughed.
