

Increased Demands Of Work Forces Resignation Of Official

A Charlottetown woman, who in 1957 was voted "Woman of the Year" by the Charlottetown Business and Professional Women's Club, has been forced to quit her position as executive secretary of the adult polio inoculation clinic because of her physical inability to meet the added demands of her job.

Mrs. Rose Savage, invalid 33-year-old mother of three children, resigned from the project staff effective March 31 when no compromise could be reached after the clinic committee decided to switch the project office from Mrs. Savage's home to the Provincial Sanatorium.

Although the committee offered to pay her transportation both ways and also provide a babysitter for the time she would be absent from home, the exertion in this daily routine would be too much for her, she maintains.

Mrs. Savage suffered an attack of polio in her youth which even now severely restricts her powers of locomotion.

Mrs. Savage fears that the loss of her salary and rent she obtained from the leasing of her home as an office, will prove a great financial hardship. "It is likely that I will have to give up my apartment and send the children away for the summer," she says.

She sadly concludes: "It all seems terribly unfair. I put a lot of effort into the work, and everything appeared to be going just fine. Everybody—doctors, nurses, voluntary workers and the public—were most kind and co-operative."

Mrs. Savage took charge of the administrative side of the clinic in 1957—the first year it was in operation—at the invitation of the responsible committee of the local chapter of the Canadian Foundation for Polio-myelitis. Prior to that she had spent 19 months undergoing treatment at the Orthopaedic Centre.

In addition she found time to act as manager of the Island Easter Seal campaign a project she undertook in conjunction with the March of Dimes campaign.

Although of a quiet and unassuming nature he made many friends, who very kindly visited him during his long illness, special mention to be made of his pastor, Rev. M. K. Charman, who paid him weekly visits and who was a great source of comfort and strength in his hours of suffering.

He received the best of care from his nephew Elmer Inman and wife, with whom he resided since the beginning of a serious turn in his illness last August, along with good medical attention.

His funeral on Monday, March 16th., was largely attended. A

short service at the home followed by service in Hampton United Church, was conducted by his pastor, Rev. M. K. Charman. Burial was in Craupad Cemetery, where he was reverently laid to rest beside loved ones gone before there to await the Glorious Resurrection Morning when the dead in Christ shall rise first.
