Germans Hope To Enlist 450,000 Troops Under Rearmament Plan

Editor's Note: This story is one of a series giving a Canadian reporter's impressions gained during a two-week tour of West Germany.

West Germany has waited patiently for the signal that would put into operation a rearmament plan in collaboration with the Western powers.

The job of blue-printing the plan has been that of a department director under Chancellor Konrad Adenauer since it was set up in 1950. It envisages the use of more than 450,000 men. The department might be considered the nucleus of a future defence ministry.

"We are ready for what we call X-day," H. Guhr, a spokesman for the department, told me. The interview in Bonn occurred during the interim between France's rejection of German rearmament under the European Defence Community and the nine-power agreement reached in London.

"Our preparations were drawn up in accordance with EDC," said Herr Guhr. "It was a blow to us when EDC fell through. Our plans are for a supra-national army in co-operation with other countries, not for a national army."

"If some agreement similar to EDC is reached under NATO or through other means, we will be ready 24 months after X-Day with 12 divisions, about 180,000 men. In addition, there would be another 180,000 as secondary or supporting troops; about 80,000 men for a future air force and 20,000 to 25,000 for a future navy."

Based on Population "These figures would be the limit based on our population. There is an old rule that for 2,000,000 population you can build one division. We have about 50,000,000 population."

"We need only about 150,000 professional soldiers. The others would serve 18 months."

Asked what he thought would be the reaction of young Germans to entering military service through conscription or otherwise, Herr Guhr said:

"Our young people are not very enthusiastic about becoming soldiers. The young people today are busy with school and jobs, and our employment level is high."

"We would have to learn from the Americans and the British about all kinds of new weapons, even atomic weapons, and the newest types of planes."

coming. We heard as we drove from the Island to Toronto that the centre of Hazel would likely cross the eastern end of Lake Ontario, but after it entered New York State it swerved and headed straight for Toronto. The cold front from the Yukon and Hazel collided over downtown Toronto near the mouth of the Humber River with torrential rain. The hurricane proved the stronger force and pushed the cold front back to the west of the Humber River so that a perfect deluge fell on the area from Halton to Guelph with Brampton as the centre.

The weather cleared along the Toronto water front early Friday evening and the Hydro people phoned Malton asking if they could send their men home. The answer was: "The worst is yet to come." Shortly afterwards wash-outs began to appear on the highways and gusts of wind rose to 70 mph. Before midnight a car was swept from the bridge into the Humber River at Woodbridge and all in it were drowned. When we drove over this bridge we could see that there had been more than four feet of water at some time flowing over the top of the bridge. The hills on either side are fairly steep and there were windrows of debris showing how high the river had been, in the fields on the adjoining hills.

It is very difficult to describe the terrible destruction that came with the floods that followed the falling of as much water as is contained in Lake Simcoe on a small area of Peel and York Counties that is drained normally by the small streams of Etobicoke and Mimico Creeks and the Humber River. There is a fall of 700 feet from Bolton and 500 feet from Brampton, where 8 inches of rain fell in 48 hours, to Lake Ontario. The floods in this steep descent came down like mill races through these three cramped outlets, overflowing the flats that "belonged to the river."

Between Thisletown and Scarlett Road, a distance of little more than a mile, the Humber River, between its high banks drops 25 feet, and the torrent swept away 14 houses and drowned 36 people. The Raymore Drive was swept away.

This ferocious and most disastrous hurricane disappeared out Hudson Strait, October 17th. Hazel, from the time it was spawned in the Caribbean until it was spent in the Canadian North, never did what was expected. In the Caribbean it first loafed, then developed winds of 120 miles per hour; these diminished by the time it reached the U. S. coast to 90 miles per hour, and averaged only 45 miles per hour with gusts to 70, at Toronto. It was like two glass jars filled with water crashing together and dumping their contents, when Hazel collided with the cold front from the northwest on the outskirts of Toronto. This caused the greatest hurricane disaster recorded in Canada.

Demands Fine On Red Wings' Assistant Trainer

TORONTO (CP) — President Conn Smythe of Toronto Maple Leafs demanded Thursday that the assistant trainer of Detroit Red Wings be fined \$1,000 for a remark allegedly shouted at a referee during a Wings-Maple Leafs game Wednesday night.

The Leafs scored late in the last period to gain a 1-1 tie in the scheduled National Hockey League game.

Smythe quoted assistant trainer Lefty Wilson of the Wings as shouting "Storey, you're yellow," at referee Red Storey.

"I went to referee-in-chief Carl Voss and he told me he heard Wilson and was going to take care of his referees," Smythe said. "Well I'm taking care of the league. We're not putting up with exhibitions of that nature. It calls for a \$1,000 fine and I'm going to demand that he gets it."

WANTS REDS OUTLAWED GUATEMALA (AP) — Inaugurating Guatemala's new Constituent Assembly, President Carlos Castillo Armas urged the body Friday to "outlaw the Communist party, clearly and unequivocally." He said it would be "dangerous to believe the Reds have all been uprooted" since last June, when he led a successful revolt against the Communist-supported regime of ex-president Jacobo Arbenz Guzman.
