

# Need For Revision Seen In Canadian Tax System

In the meantime, government should not embark upon any large new expenditures that would either increase the existing tax rate, or that would cut up the increased yield of higher production without granting individual relief; and people should not ask government to undertake such new expenditures.

Every decision has resulted in the growth of large and high-priced staffs of experts whose purpose in life is to find the paths with the least tax penalties. This is described by many as a waste of talent.

The much time is spent on finding loopholes and, on the part of government tax authorities, to plugging loopholes. The tax system has grown up on a patchwork basis and now is out-of-date. All these arguments and many others were heard at a discussion at the recent annual meeting in Montreal of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association. # Six Liberal Party Members Are Thrust Into Limelight

OTTAWA (CP)—Six men had national prominence thrust upon them in the current election campaign by the one man they are pooling their talents to defeat, Prime Minister Diefenbaker.

They came from the relative obscurity and anonymity of private business and the civil service to become influential members of Liberal Leader Pearson's campaign team. If Mr. Pearson is elected prime minister on June 18, the six are bound to be prominent office-holders in the new Liberal administration.

They are Mitchell Sharp of Toronto, former deputy trade minister under the late C. D. Howe; Walter Gordon, Toronto economist and business consultant; Maurice Lamontagne, Quebec City economist; C. M. (Bud) Drury, former deputy defence minister; Tom Kent, former editor of the Winnipeg Free Press; and John R. Nicholson of Vancouver, a wartime deputy controller of supplies.

Mr. Gordon, 56, was the chairman of the royal commission of Canada's economic prospects which produced a 1957 report forecasting the next half-century.

Mr. Nicholson, 45, joined the public service in 1951 as assistant northern affairs minister. He then was economic adviser to former Liberal Prime Minister St. Laurent, and later to Mr. Pearson.

Mr. Nicholson, a lawyer, was deputy controller of supplies when Mr. Howe was minister of munitions and supply, and later was one of the organizers of the crown-owned synthetic rubber company, Polymer Corporation.

Mr. Diefenbaker singled out the six last year when the election pot was hot boiling in the boil, saying they represented "the same old gang" of bureaucrats who "pushed Parliament around" during the Second World War and after it, when
