

Local and Other Items.

PARNELL is expected in Montreal on Tuesday next.

FOREIGN MAILS arrived in this city at 3 o'clock p. m. to-day.

The City Council will meet this evening to consider the taxing of personal property.

EIGHTEEN persons were killed on the Intercolonial Railway last year.

The horse-race of the season comes off on Orwell ice to-morrow (weather permitting).

REMEMBER Prof. Anderson's lecture on "Macbeth" in St. Patrick's Hall this evening.

WM. McCOMBIE, of Tellyfour, Aberdeenshire, the greatest stock-raiser in Scotland, died on the 1st inst.

CYRUS P. LOVEJOY, of Milltown, St. Stephen, N. B., committed suicide by hanging himself on Tuesday last.

A writ is issued for the partial election in New London District. Nominations take place on the 20th inst., and election on the 27th.

SOME GENTLEMEN left an overcloak in the Legislative Council yesterday afternoon. The owner can have the same by applying to the Doorkeeper.

A HORSE-RACE takes place on Montague ice on Wednesday, 10th March. Liberal prizes offered. And another race for a set of silver mounted harness, valued at \$60, takes place at Georgetown on the 9th inst.

At the inquest on the body of Kate McDonald, who died suddenly in Carlton, N. B., on Saturday, the jury returned a verdict of "death from an overdose of oil of cedar."

LEGISLATIVE.—In the House of Assembly the address will be moved by Mr. Crawford, and seconded by Mr. McDonald, of Mount Stewart. In the Legislative Council the address will be moved by Mr. Burns and seconded by Mr. McMillan.

COL. INGERSOLL having said that the preachers in this country cost the people \$12,000,000 every year, answer is made by one of the religious newspapers that the lawyers cost about \$70,000,000, the criminals \$40,000, and whisky \$600,000,000.

The population of South Australia (capital Adelaide) is 303,829; of Queensland, 201,510, seven per cent. of which are Chinese. The area of Queensland equals that of the British Islands, France, Spain, Portugal, Italy and Switzerland.

The popular estimate of the population of Russia is very far behind the times. The grand total of the population for the year ending Dec. 31, 1879, it places at 97,000,000, which figures it predicts, will in two years be increased to 1,000,000,000.

SINCE writing the account of the drowning accident at Harbor's mouth (published on first page) it was reported that the body of Mr. Finigan was recovered, but we learn that the report is unfounded. A large number of people were at the scene of the accident this forenoon, grappling for the body. The overcoat of the deceased was recovered, but nothing else.

A small market to-day (Friday.) Prices as follows: Beef (small) 5 to 12 cts. per lb.; beef (gr.) from 4 to 7 cents per lb.; mutton, from 5 to 10 cents per lb.; pork (per lb.) from 7 to 9 cents; pork (per carcass) from 5 to 6 cents; turkeys, from 80 to \$1.30; geese, from 50 to 60 cents each; chickens, from 50 to 60 cents per pair; butter (fresh) from 18 to 22 cents per lb.; butter (tub) from 18 to 20 cent per lb.; potatoes, from 15 to 16 cents per bushel; oats, from 39 to 40 cents; hay, from 30 to 34 cents per 100 lbs.

The Cumberland Meat and Produce Company shipped in the "Peruvian" for England, Saturday, 142 tubs butter (valued at \$1,617), 74 barrels potatoes, 21 carcasses mutton, 9 packages beef and pork, and 74 barrels potatoes. Total value of shipment, \$2,584. Messrs. G. P. & J. C. Henry shipped 5 packages dead meat (as described in the "Mail" a few days since), and Messrs. John F. Crowe & Co., 14 boxes mutton. The Starr Manufacturing Company sent 41 cases Acacia skates, and Messrs. S. Cunard & Co. shipped 646 packages butter, 240 bbls. apples, and a quantity of sundries from Ontario.—*Haltifax Mail.*

LECTURE ON EDUCATION.—D. Montgomery, Esq., Superintendent of Education, delivered an excellent address on Education at Montague Bridge on Tuesday night last. Among those present we noticed Rev. John McKinnon, of Georgetown, occupying the chair; Revs. Wm. P. Balen, E. Bell, and R. Stevenson, of Montague Bridge, and W. Bryenton, of Lower Montague. The Schoolroom was packed with an orderly and appreciative audience, whose ages ranged from five to sixty years. The lecturer, in a practical and logical style, defined the duty of the Government in passing, and from time to time improving, an efficient School Law, the qualifications required by teachers, and the enthusiasm every parent and ratepayer should cherish in order to advance the cause of popular education. At the conclusion he was tendered a hearty vote of thanks.—*Advertiser.*

DOMINION PARLIAMENT!!

Special Dispatch to the Examiner.

OTTAWA, March 4.

After the usual notice, Mr. Bechard introduced a Bill to reduce the salaries of public officers, and the indemnity to members of Parliament.

Mr. Colby moved the third reading of the repeal act abolishing the Insolvency Laws, Carried.

On the second reading of Mr. Blake's Bill for the effectual prevention of crime, Baker opposed the Bill on the grounds that police espionage was only submitted to in crowded populations, because it was the least of the two evils. In Canada we had a sparse population, and did not need to subject our criminal population to the same restraint deemed necessary in England. Under the late Government 115 persons had been pardoned. Blake was responsible for this exercise of clemency, and the result was an increase of crime. Now Blake would come in with a Bill that was a propitiatory sacrifice to the indignant feelings of an outraged people. The Bill was a caricature of the English Act. He criticised severely the several provisions of the Bill, and then moved the six months hoist.

Hon. Mr. McDonald (Picton) criticised the Bill. He thought it inopportune, and believed all power necessary was already given to wards of penitentiaries. He considered the present system better than the severely punished system advocated by Blake.

Blake argued that there was a necessity for the Bill, and discussed its provisions.

Plumb ridiculed the Bill as giving village dogberries power to apprehend persons on mere suspicion.

Mousseau also ridiculed the Bill as meddling and not practical, tending to have a special class held up to public approbrium.

Rymal thought it wanting in statesmanship, because it had utterly ignored the North-west Territory, where people often came from other countries determined to lead an honest life, but they would be at the mercy of every constable who, armed with the photograph, might for personal spite brand them as criminal for even a common assault.

Hilton said there were clauses in the bill which would lead him to vote against it on the third reading. He thought the bill ought to have a second reading.

White thought the principle of the bill bad, and that was what was discussed on the second reading.

Anglin thought no measure of Blake's would be acceptable to the majority. He argued in favor of the bill.

McDonald (Picton) repudiated anything like personal animus.

Bunster objected to the bill as stamping the children as well as the criminal. The bill was so obnoxious to him that he would move the twelve months hoist.

After several other persons had spoken the six months hoist was carried on a division.

The house proceeded to the consideration of the deceased wife's sisters' bill. Houde speaking in French against the bill.

The debate turned upon the respective powers of the Local and Federal Legislatures.

Jones opposed the bill on the grounds that no agitation has been had in favor of it.

Wright supported the bill, and the debate dragged its slow way wearily along till after ten, when the House divided for six months' hoist—20 against 140. The bill was carried by the same vote reversed.

LONDON, March 4.

The *Times* states that since spring set in, considerable stir appears in emigration at Queenstown. The people of the rural classes and both sexes are flocking thither and departing for America, and the arrival of large remittances from American friends are attracting people thither. It is anticipated that after Easter there will be an unusual rush of emigrants to America.

In the House of Lords the Irish relief Bill passed through committees without amendment.

ST. PETERSBURG, March 4.

The man who fired upon Gen. Melikoff is a converted Jew named Modestky, from Minsk, 430 miles south of St. Petersburg.

He was tried and sentenced to day, and will be hanged to-morrow. He maintains a defiant demeanor.
