An unknown and fatal disease, which has hitherto baffled local medical skill, has made its appearance in two townships in the county of Richmond, Que. The complaint, which is said to be extremely infectious, appears to set in with syncope, followed by diphtheritic symptoms, and ultimately by death from asphyxia.

The Ontario Government have recently effected an important timber sale in the Muskoka and Barry Sound districts. The sale consists of seventy-two "Berths," containing 1281 square miles, at prices which averaged about \$600 per square mile, including ground rent and duns. The gross proceeds of the sale will reach \$717,176. The decided success of this sale and the unprecedentedly high prices realized may be learned by a comparison of the sale of 1872, when the average price reached less than \$300 per square mile. It was undoubtedly the largest and most successful sale of the kind ever held in Canada.

BESIDES equalizing the burdens of taxation so that on the article of tea, for instance, the poor man ceased to be under the harrow, while the rich man got clear, as Sir Richard Cartwright's tariff had arranged it, the present tariff provides for the business of the country in tea being done by our own merchants, instead of being done, as under the Grit regime, by United States merchants. In 1878 the import of tea from the United States was 4,603,232 pounds, and the import from abroad was 1,664,984. In 1880 we imported from the States but 2,694,042 pounds, and from abroad 3,751,954 pounds. That is, our own merchants secured the profit which before went to the importers of the United States. On the tea question the record of the Liberal-Conservative party is a record of common sense, fair play, and wise arrangement.—Toronto Mail.

The passenger and freight Tariff of the Northern Light has been published, and is as follows:—Passengers, each \$3.00; berth, each voyage, \$1; breakfast, each, 40 cents; dinner 50 cents; supper 40 cents. Not more than thirty passengers will be taken on any trip, and a Register Book of Passengers will be kept at Pictou and Georgetown in which each passenger is required to register his name and address. Double first class goods per 100 lbs. 32 cents; first-class goods per 100 lbs., 16 cts.; second-class goods per 100 lbs., 12 cts.; third-class goods per 100 lbs., 10 cts.; fourth-class goods per 100 lbs., 9 cts.; flour, per barrel, 15 cts. These rates to be upon goods delivered alongside the vessel, whether at the wharf or on the ice, and all expenses incurred by the Government in conveying goods from the vessel to the wharf or vice versa, will be an extra charge on the freighter. Hides and pelts to be packed in casks or barrels and properly marked. If in bundles these goods will not be taken.

To GIVE our readers an idea of the confidence in the Bank of P. E. Island abroad, even after the present suspension, the following incident is instructive: "An operator here wishing to make something by discounting Bank paper, commissioned a friend at Port Hawkesbury to purchase at low a figure as possible. On Saturday evening he received by mail the result of his friend's operations, with an explanatory note to the effect that he had purchased something over one hundred dollars of Union Bank paper for 90 cents to the dollar, and about the same amount in Merchants Bank paper, which he could not get for less than the same discount; but that he had done a good thing in "Old Bank paper, and had got some \$200 at 95 cents; and that this latter paper was hard to get even at that figure, and holders showed no disposition to sell."

The writer was aware that Islanders held this paper pretty firmly, the last quotation being 99 for cash, 100 cents for goods; but hardly expected that outsiders would have such reliable information as to the Bank's soundness.—Com.
