SCOTT ACT AT SOURIS.—Before Stipendiary Magistrate Joseph Kennedy, of that place, was convicted of a first contravention of the Canada Temperance Act and fined in the sum of \$30 and costs. The witnesses against M. J. Foley and Angus Macdonald were dismissed.

SHIPMENT OF MITTOS.—The Summerside Farmer says: The first shipment of mittos was made by Mr. Geo. E. Fall on Tuesday last via the Northumberland. A carload in a refrigerator car, prepared for the purpose, was brought up from Hunter River on Monday and placed in the refrigerator of the Northumberland en route to Boston. The shipment consists of 91 crates valued at \$480.

ASTRONOMY.—On Saturday afternoon Professor Cox, of Halifax, will deliver his scenic lecture on Astronomy in the Philharmonic Hall, for the benefit of the pupils of the city schools. On Tuesday and Thursday evenings next week the lecture will be repeated for older folk. Rev. E. N. Archibald, writing from Lunenburg, says: "The Professor is thoroughly conversant with the subject, and no student or admirer of the wonderful works of God can afford to miss such a grand treat."

THE CHEESE INDUSTRY.—One hundred and seventy-three boxes of cheese from the Murray Harbor South factory came in by the steamer Electra last night, and sixty-five from New Perth. The Murray Harbor South factory is closed for the season. The quantity of milk received at the factory during the season was nearly 250,000 pounds, and 373 boxes of cheese were made. The butter-making plant at I outfit for the New Perth factory has been shipped from London, Ont. It is expected that in a short time it will be put in, and butter made.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon, John McCabe was fined \$20 or 90 days imprisonment for being drunk and incapable yesterday evening. The total number of vessels lost was 29, against 19 last year. Total insurance \$155,053. Total lives lost 115, against 55 last year. Many of the unfortunates left families in this city, the provinces or European countries.

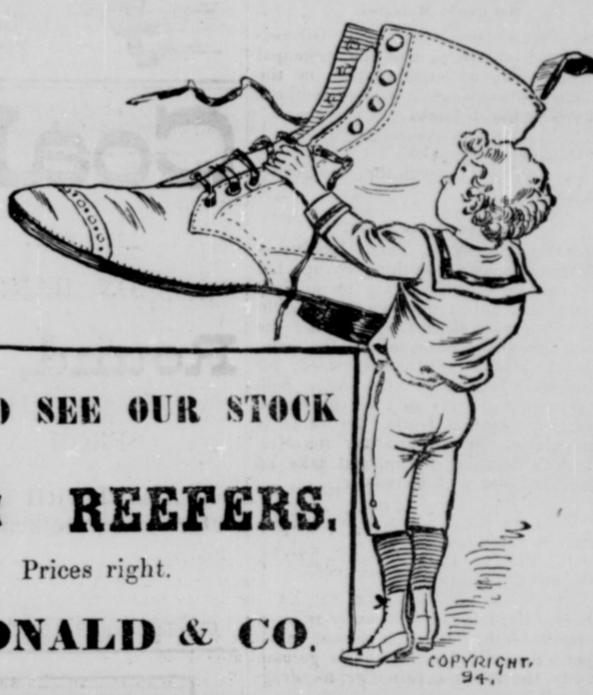
